AN EDITORIAL







Then there was the librarian at Lincoln who was always there...at least until 1968. Margaret Atchison provided guidance on research projects and recreational reading for the entire career of many Lincoln students. She was a consistent influence.







This consistency was thoroughly realized while browsing in my sister's 1944 "Lionian". There was a picture of a pert young Margaret with dark hair and no glasses. That wasn't the way I remembered her.

So I looked at my brother's 1950 "Lionian" and noticed the distinct change in Miss Atchison's appearance. Eye glasses were now being worn and a softness had been replaced by a look of persistence. By the time Margaret was photographed for the picture in my graduation year "Lionian" in 1958, she was showing signs of the thousands of Dewey decimal numbers at which she had squinted.

IF WE COULD TURN BACK TIME

The sweat accumulates on my face, my glasses start slipping down my nose. I take a quick break during my daily workout at the Downtown YMCA to wipe my brow and push up

my glasses. The rock music from a local radio station blares songs I seldom recognize or even pay attention to. However, there is one recent tune I will listen to closely. It provokes my mind to wander, reflecting memories of the past and what I should do in the future. Yes, Cher says it well for all of us in her latest top 40 hit song, "If I could turn back time..."

One of but many, many things I would change if I really could go back in time would be to spend a little more time getting to know the man who was the principal of Lincoln High School for twenty years. Of course, I must remember when I was a student you simply did not go out of your way to cross paths with THE Principal. (...starts with a P, rhymes with T and that stands for

William Wolfarth, a 1932 graduate of Canton McKinley High School, became principal of Lincoln in 1954. During four years of infrequent interaction with him, I do recall how he stood leaning against a wall watching the students change classes. He would smile and respond with a pleasant greeting as one would acknowledge his presence. To the best of my recollection, he always seemed so calm. (Based on my limited experience as a manager of people, I now realize he really must have been like the duck who on the surface of the water appears to be quite idle, but under the water, his little legs are pumping as fast as possible to keep afloat.)

Mr. Wolfarth retired from his long education career in 1974. I do not know when he moved to Fort Myers, Florida, but he died there fourteen years after retirement on November 3, 1988.

I am sure by now you are thinking, what the heck does this guy care about an old principal. Well, I do have my own reasons, and I will briefly disclose one. In Mr. Wolfarth's obituary column in The Repository, I read about a side of this man I never knew. It stated that during World War II, Mr. Wolfarth was a pilot for the big bomber plane, the B-17. Of coincidence, I have had an interest in this plane and the men who served on them even before high school. I do not know if I would have had the nerve to ask Mr. Wolfarth about his experiences during the war; after all, many combat veterans do not choose to share their ordeal with others. But I do know one thing...for me, and perhaps for me alone...knowing this would have somewhat changed the way I thought about this man while at Lincoln and over the last twenty

There really is a point to what I have confided with you. Cher's moving song will be off the charts in a few short weeks, but at least part of her words should have an impact on each of us for the rest of our lives.

I am as guilty as anyone for not keeping in contact with my friends from Lincoln. The Lincoln Alumni Association is one way I plan to 'turn back time' and seek to get to better know many of you I had the privilege of sharing my high school years with. I encourage you to get involved in your Alumni Association to whatever degree you can commit at your earliest opportunity. This is a chance for you to 'turn back time' and share the past, present and future with those who have a unique and common identity with you.

INTERNATIONAL MEMBERSHIP **CAMPAIGN CHAIRPERSON IS SOUGHT**


HELP!!! WHERE'S OUR LINCOLN FLAG????

Mr. Weedman has been setting an example to his past and future students by graduating with outstanding scholastic honors from his class of nearly 500 men.

Our "teacher turned soldier" is anticipating a five-day furlough which will get him home in time to attend the Lincoln-Lehman game, Oct. 10. If present plans are carried out, Lieut. Weedman will be honored by a special performance of the Lincoln band at the "half."

LINCOLN BAND WINS GLORY
Takes First Prize in American Legion
Parade

The coloiful Lincoln High marching band won fame and glory on August 16th, when it captured first prize in the state-wide parade competition, sponsored by the American Legion at their annual state convention. In winning this honor they were judged superior to 16 other junior bands, including the nationally famous Washington High "Swing Band" from Massillon. The judging was based on cadence (set at 128 steps per minute), cover and drers, general appearance, and quality of music. When the scores were finally totaled, our band had the very high score of 97.6.

Early in August, Mr. Mason asked if we would represent our school in the Legion "Victory" parade. The band gladly agreed, athough it meant much extra work, such as passing out uniforms, memorizing music, etc. Although all Canton High School Bands were invited to participate, ours was the only one prepared to do so. Our effort, however, was well repaid, as we received in addition to First Prize, a \$25 War Savings Bond. Incidentally, a Newsreel Company devoted part of one of their newsreels to, our band. This was seen as far away as littsburg.

The band has been reorganized and made into a military band, with officers, military rules, etc. So, if you see three chevrons on the right sleeve of a uniform you will know that the wearer is one of the four band sergeants. They are: Bob White, percussion; Bob Kerry, light brass; Bob Lowe, reeds; Lloyd Bower, heavy brass.

Two chevrons indicates a rank corporal. These are: Reading Rentz, Dwight Arnold, Bill Bergert. Dorothy Bremcamp, Mildred Lent, Bill Evans, Ronald Everett. Jack Stevenson.

One chevron indicates a first class musician. To obtain one of these the musician must pass a stiff test covering scales, musical terms, marching, etc.

The bars on the left sleeve indicate the number of years the wearer has been in the band.

Before an amazed crowd of over 14,000, a courageous band of Lincoln Lions battled the heavily favored McKinley Bulldogs to a 0-0 deadlock. Although outweighed seven pounds per man, Lincoln continually outfought their highly touted opponents. In giving their excellent performance, Lincoln served notice to the city that football in Canton is no longer to be completely dominated by McKinley as it has been in the past. The reign of McKinley in basketball has been broken by both Lehman and Timken last year but this is the first serious intra-city competition the Bulldogs have been given in football.

Three times the mighty Bulldogs penetrated the Lincoln 20 yard line advancing to the 14 twice and to the 13, and three times the strong Licn forward wall headed by substitute, Jack Heckaman and Red Stauffer, stopped their foes cold. Dick Bamburger, center, also play-



MEMBERSHIP OPEN TO ALL "FRIENDS OF LINCOLN"

Yes, even your mother-in-law (take your choice of which one) is encouraged to become an active and enthusiastic member of the Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association which has just been born in the summer of '89. But we've got a deal for you-fill in the membership form below and bring it along with your check for \$10 to the annual meeting on September 26, in the auditorium of LHS and you

will instantly become a member for the remainder of 1989, as well as a founding member paid through the calendar year 1990. Founding members will be designated as such in the records of the association and in other appropriate ways yet to be determined.

Perhaps more importantly, your contribution will enable this association to broaden its foundation on which the various projects and activities will be built. You need only skim the headlines (but preferably read the stories) in this newsletter to notice the optimistic plans developed by the organizing members who are hoping you will join their fold.
