## REFLECTIONS ON A VISIT HOME

For two hours on the evening of September 26, 1989, Heritage Christian School, that grand old building at the corner of 6th Street and Harrison Avenue, Southwest, was once again Canton Lincoln High School, as the Lincoln Alumni Association met there for its first annual general membership meeting.

During those two hours, old friendships were renewed, new friendships were formed, and many, many memories were rekindled. The old school colors, maroon and gold, were evident everywhere: displayed in the lobby, in the auditorium, and in clothing of those who gathered. Banners, coffee mugs, T-shirts, and key chains all bore the familiar color scheme and the savage lion's head logo we all remember so well. Tables of memorabilia, including photos, yearbooks, athletic programs, newspapers, and awards, helped us for a few brief moments to recall those "good old days" when we spent so many hours there. Even a few of our former faculty members, our teachers, were on hand to share their memories and good wishes. So many memories...

For me, the most poignant part of the whole evening was hearing the strains of the Lincoln Alma Mater and Fight Song as they rang once more in that revered old hall, while its namesake's portrait gazed serenely out over the assembly from its familiar place above the stage, as if he knew we were there again, and why.

Sitting there, looking up at that portrait with its two quotations emblazoned alongside, I seemed to be transported back in time more than twenty years, to other days and evenings when I had sat there and read those words: when I first began taking music lessons in that auditorium, all the pep rallies and band concerts, the honors programs, my own graduation day...and the many other times I had read them.

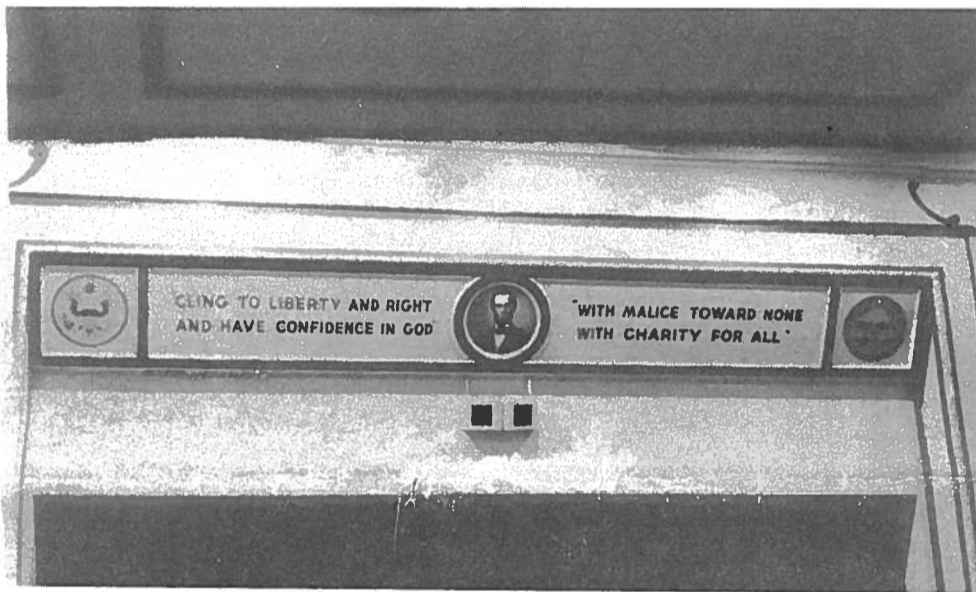
"Cling to liberty and right and have confidence in God" and "With malice toward none; with charity for all." Bold words! Proud words! Words which are every bit as meaningful and appropriate as guideposts to a good and decent

life today as they were when they were spoken, more than one-hundred twenty years ago. How happy and proud I am that the building's new owners have seen fit to leave them there as a legacy from Lincoln High School to Heritage Christian School, so present and future generations of students may read and ponder them!

Yes, for those two hours, that evening, I was home. I never studied Latin, but I have always been of the opinion that the translation of **alma mater** has something to do with home and family. A person can have more than one home: a personal family home, a spiritual home, a learning home. And a person can have more than one family. Those who were gathered in the auditorium that evening have something in common: we all shared that building as our home of learning, and as such, we constitute a kind of family. The building's years may be numbered, but the family can and must go on. The family members have spent a number of years drifting apart, meeting only rarely, and in small groups, but now it has begun to

come back together. I know this because of the good, warm feelings I had while I was sitting there that evening. I believe others felt it, too. We were all home.

I also have a good feeling about the organization which we are forming. Knowing all the good things Lincoln High School stood for during its thirty-plus years, and knowing the kind of people who have come forth from those halls, I can't help being confident that the legacy of Canton Lincoln High School has not yet been fulfilled. If anyone has any doubts, they weren't looking closely enough at the faces in the auditorium that Tuesday evening. I was looking at the faces, and in them I saw a determination to accomplish something good...for themselves, for the memory of their school, and for their community...a determination to once again remind Canton, Ohio what the spirit of Lincoln High School is all about!

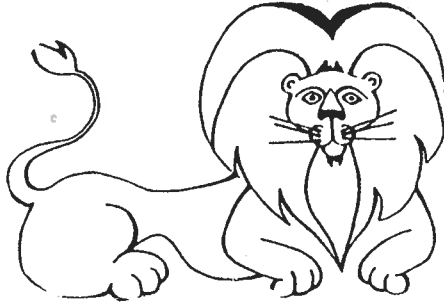
Lincoln grads seem to seek one another out if they hear the magic name of Lincoln High School, which was a part of so many of our teen years.

As we climbed the time-worn stairs of the stately edifice, a flood of emotions came over me—mostly good. # LION'S ROAR.....

## Lincoln Peace Corps Workers, Bill and Nila Bonevich Welch

In the corner of a charming, antique-filled kitchen in Canton sit two canoe oars, handcarved with huge bush knives by natives of the Solomon Islands. They are tangible reminders for Bill and Nila Welch of the two years' service they recently completed in the Peace Corps. But tangible reminders are hardly necessary when you have memories of the bright children and kind, patient adults who live on those remote Southern Pacific isles.

The Welches are a Canton Lincoln High School family through and through. Not only did Bill ('46) and Nila ('47) graduate from CLHS, but so did all four of their children, Lee ('67), Chris ('68), Ed ('71), and Tim ('73).

Their family and friends became valuable assistants to Bill and Nila's Peace Corps job by supplementing teaching tools such as pencils and paper. There were no books or curriculums available when the Welches arrived. Nila developed her own programs to teach home economics, health, English; as did Bill when he taught woodworking, mechanics, math and geography. They both tried to instruct their students in current events, but most Solomon natives can't fathom an outside world. Their students, ages 16-22, were curious and very religious, but had received little or no schooling because there are not enough schools.

Most people in the Solomons exist by fishing and gardening. The only commercial products are timber, fish, and copra—dried coconut from which palm oil and soap are made. Wives are bought, and women do most of the work. The Solomons were once a British protectorate, so they retain the British traits of parliamentary democracy with a prime minister, a token native governor/general appointed by Queen Elizabeth, and socialized medicine.

The setting in which the Welches taught was a rural training center administered by the Anglican Church. Bill and Nila communicated with their students in pidgin English—which all Solomon tribes speak, since the 7 main islands and hundreds of small islands have 88 languages of their own. There were absolutely no discipline problems in the Welches' classes except tardiness—acceptable in that easygoing lifestyle, and students trying to do some of their copious Bible homework in another class.

In their leisure time the students enjoyed soccer. They also played a form of volleyball, sometimes using heads and feet to hit the ball, but no hands. Competition is not important to them, so there's no scoring. They also enjoyed native music and dancing, fishing, swimming, picnicking, and playing cards. Any criminal activities usually stemmed from alcohol abuse. There are no roads, nor any electricity there. Morning and evening church services were faithfully attended.

The Welches used their off-duty hours to write letters, read, and play cards, and Nila sewed while Bill joined the native sports. There had been 32 Peace Corps volunteers sent to the Solomon Islands together, but they lived on separate islands. So the only time the Welches saw any other white people was the weekly trip by church canoe to a market across the bay.

The isolation was virtually complete and Nila says, "The most difficult part of the entire experience was waiting for the mail plane. It was supposed to arrive twice a week, but sometimes it didn't come because of potholes, too much passenger luggage, or pigs on the runway!" Once a week the Peace Corps sent the Welches a packet of newspapers and newsmagazines which they devoured.

Shelter for Bill and Nila consisted of a three room house with screens, but no plumbing. There they worked on the next day's lessons in the evenings and rested from the extreme heat in the afternoons. School was only in session from 8 a.m. to half-past noon because of that heat.

Three times in their two years' service, the Welches were sent for R & R to Honiara, Guadalcanal—a "big city" of 20,000 people, where Nila contracted malaria during one visit. She described it as feeling like a bad case of flu. The disease was quickly dispelled by the correct medication. Both Welches lauded the excellent dental and medical care the Peace Corps provided constantly. They also credited their generally excellent health to the simple, daily diet of fish and native fruits and vegetables.

On Nov. 13, 1989, almost two years to the day of their arrival, Bill and Nila Welch headed home. But what a route home! They spent five weeks traveling through Bali, Australia, and Europe before arriving in Canton, Dec. 20. On that homeward route, Bali and Austria were their favorite stops. About the future, the Welches muse, "We'll play it as it comes." However, they're already involved in volunteer work and Bill's part-time job. Biggest adjustments to returning to U.S. life have been getting reacquainted with the fast pace and materialistic attitudes here. Both say, "If people would only realize it, we could live with so much less and still be happy."

Volunteering for the Peace Corps is not a simple procedure. After calling a toll-free number, prospective corps members must submit a lengthy, written application, submit to a rigorous medical exam, be cleared by the FBI, and undergo personal interviews. There is no upper age limit. 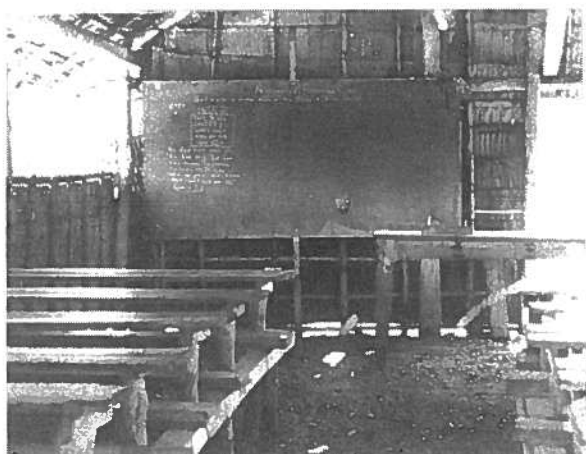

# CLHSAA ANNOUNCES SCHOLARSHIP GRANT PROGRAM

Education continues to offer us the best means of a better tomorrow. As a new decade begins, the last of this amazing century, leaders from all facets of our lives are reminding us that we must expand upon our educational achievements if we wish to effectively deal with the challenges of our personal, community and international lives. Moreover, that education should not be concentrated in the minds of a few, but must be spread throughout our society if we are to progress.

As a group of people bound together by a common educational experience at Lincoln High School, it is only natural for us to reaffirm the value of education by promoting the means by which students may acquire it. Therefore, we have established a scholarship grant program as a major function of this alumni association.

Through grants—non-repayable awards of cash, our Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association will give notice to LHS graduates and their lineal descendants that continuing one's education is a desirable pursuit. These grants are potentially available to students of all ages, as long as a person is a graduate, or was an attendee of Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School, or a lineal descendant of such. The student applicant may be living anywhere. This program is not limited to 1990 high school graduates and, therefore, is available to students at more advanced levels of education in academic and technical schools.

Funds have come to the Scholarship Grant Program by varied means. Some money has been dedicated by the CLHSAA Executive Committee from the annual membership contributions and the profit from the 1989 Thanksgiving dance. There is an amount anticipated from the

February fund-raising event. Additionally, there have been specific contributions to the program by the Class of 1974, David Everett '74 and Donna Tornicelli '59. Mr. Lou Thomas of T.K. Harris Commercial Real Estate Services donated \$100 in memory of Tom A. Taylor, '51, who was president of T.K. Harris, Coldwell Banker Real Estate at the time of his death in October of 1988.

The volunteer members of the scholarship committee have expressed their desire to maintain flexibility in the potential amounts of money to be granted to a student.

Therefore, we have established a scholarship grant program as a major function of this alumni association.*

Due to this being the first year of this program, and because the exact amount of money available for grants will not be known until later this spring, such an approach is the most sensible. There is a hope that you, an "Echoes" reader, will send a donation for this important cause and even consider including this program in your will.

Contributors will be recognized with a personalized certificate of appreciation and publication of their names in

association printings. They will be grouped as follows:

\$1000 and above pledged for two consecutive years can be identified with the name of a business (sponsor) or individual (perhaps in memoriam of a graduate, or the giver).

Every student interested in applying for a CLHSAA grant for the 1990-91 should act immediately by requesting an application packet. Send each request to the special scholarship post office box, not the regular membership box. Address it to: CLHSAA Scholarship Grant Program, P.O. Box 80575, Canton, Ohio 44708. The deadline for receipt of the completed application is 3 P.M. on May 8, 1990. You should act now in order to allow sufficient time for the packet request to be processed and for the student to adequately complete the application requirements.

Final selection of students to receive the grants will be no later than July 2, student notification and an awards ceremony will follow. Grant money will be sent directly to each student's school in time for the beginning of the term. It is hoped that this program will aid and encourage many people to continue to seek more knowledge.

## PURPOSE, CRITERIA, AND GUIDELINES FOR THE 1990 SCHOLARSHIP GRANT PROGRAM

The purpose of the scholarship committee, as a segment of the Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association, shall be to recommend the awarding of economic assistance in the form of non-repayable grants of money to deserving students who either attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School or who are the lineal descendants of Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School attendees or graduates.

The guiding criteria for selection of students who will receive economic assistance shall be as follows:

- (1) financial need
- (2) scholastic achievement
- (3) ACT or SAT scores, if available
- (4) residential and/or school community involvement
- (5) individual educational objectives
- (6) CLHSAA application form
- (7) recommendations
- (8) scholarship committee interview

(1) Financial need shall be determined as a result of studying information supplied by the applicant on the Financial Aid Form (FAF) available from high school counselors or from college and technical school financial assistance offices. The applicant shall include a copy of his/her FAF when submitting the completed CLHSAA application form.

(2-3) Scholastic achievement shall take into account the school grades of the applicant as shown on school transcripts, ACT or SAT scores, if available, the nature of coursework undertaken by the applicant and the recommendations of school faculty.

(4) Residential and/or school community involvement includes but is not limited to contributions of time and energy by the applicant as a volunteer, as a member of religious or civic organizations, and as a participant in other extra-curricular activities such as hobbies, scouting, athletics, the arts and music, etc.

(5) Individual educational objectives of the applicant shall be identified by him/her in writing and submitted with the application form and those objectives shall be subject to further clarification during the personal interview. His/her individual educational objectives should explain why the applicant wishes to receive financial aid in the form of a grant from CLHSAA and what the applicant hopes to accomplish in school and in life.

(6) The CLHSAA application form shall be used by each applicant to provide the information requested. The scholarship committee shall consider the completeness and neatness of the applicant's information on the application

form when recommending the selection of the applicants who will receive financial assistance.

(7) Three written recommendations of the applicant from non-relatives shall be submitted with each CLHSAA application form.

(8) If invited by the scholarship committee, an applicant shall make himself/herself available for a personal interview. The committee shall consider the demeanor, ability to verbally communicate, candor and general presentation of those applicants interviewed. Some applicants may be eliminated from being selected for recommendation based upon criterion numbers 1 through 7; and therefore, they would not be invited for an interview. If an invited applicant is not available to be interviewed in person, the committee may permit the applicant to supply video taped answers to committee questions. Another possibility may be a telephone conversation between the applicant and committee members. However, a personal appearance will be most desirable.

The scholarship committee shall consider all eight criterion before selecting those applicants to be recommended to receive the CLHSAA financial assistance grants. No one criterion shall carry more weight or significance than any other, but all criteria shall be considered together.

The scholarship executive committee members shall deny no applicant consideration for a grant because of the applicant's race, color, creed, religion, sex, or national origin. All Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association Executive and Scholarship Committee members must understand that the information in each applicant's FAF and application is strictly confidential and only the applicant's name, address, telephone number and name of parent or relative who attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School may be released to other members of CLHSAA or the public.

The Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association reserves the right to determine the amount and number of grants to be presented in any given year. Only students who expect to attend an accredited university, college or trade school shall be considered for receipt of said grants.

Notification by letter of selection or rejection of each applicant shall be provided within eight weeks of the current year's application deadline. An award ceremony shall be planned for a date following that notification.

The total amount of the economic assistance offered to each selected applicant shall be sent from Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association directly to the accredited

institution following the scholarship committee's receipt of proof that the selected applicant is a registered student.

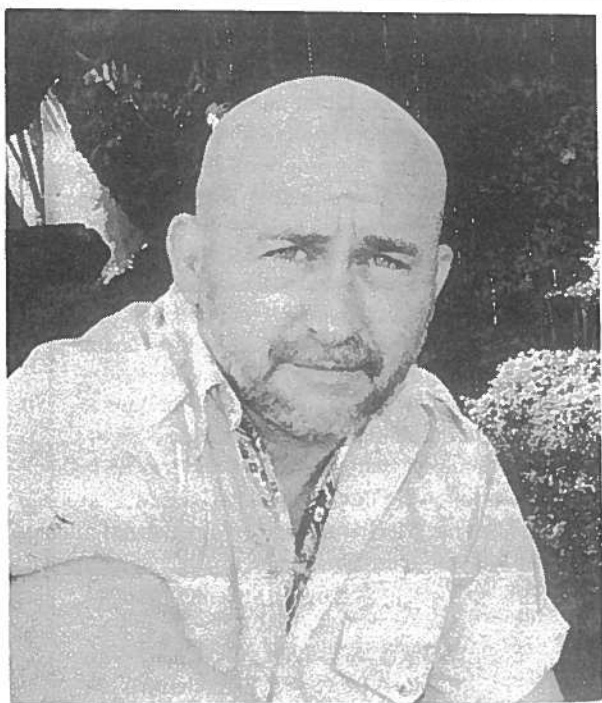

In 1988 Steve resigned his coaching position and moved on to administration at the junior high level. At present he is principal of Malabar Junior High School with over 900 students.

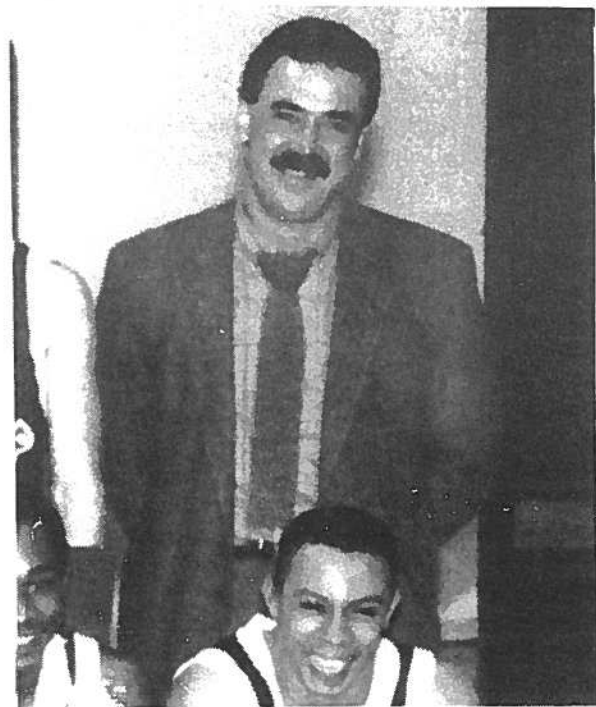

# SPORTS MEMORIES.....

## Lincoln Roar Heard Across State

December 1, 1945 Lincoln 0, Toledo 0

The Lincoln Lions first roared loud enough to be heard across the entire state on December 1, 1945 when they outplayed the undefeated, untied and unsuspecting Toledo Waite Indians in a scoreless deadlock before 21,000 football fans at Fawcett Stadium.

Waite, winner of 10 straight games, had been ranked No. 1 in Ohio for eight consecutive weeks. And justifiably so. The Indians, with Coach Jack Mollenkopf, who later served as head coach at Purdue University for a number of years, had averaged 27.9 points a game while recording seven shutouts and holding opponents to an average of 2.5 points per game.

Lincoln, meanwhile, was unranked and largely unnoticed despite winning seven games and playing 7-7 and 0-0 ties with Canton McKinley and Massillon, respectively. Massillon was ranked fifth in the state with five victories and five ties and McKinley was seventh with seven wins, one loss and two ties.

The Lions had averaged 12.4 points a game and given up 2.9 a game while defeating Wooster, Akron Buchtel, Canton Lehman, Niles, Alliance, Barberton and Canton Timken. Only Barberton scored twice against the Lions, losing 31-13.

Lehman, with only a 6-0 loss to Lincoln—marring its record entering the final game of the season against Youngstown Woodrow Wilson, had planned to challenge Waite to a post-season game. But the Polar Bears lost their finale and deferred to Lincoln and Coach Junie Ferrall.

Lincoln issued the challenge and Waite, with little to gain and a lot to lose, accepted.

In its third year as a full-fledged senior high school, Lincoln placed three seniors—end Bruce Beatty, captain and tackle Tony Zettler and guard Ron Bowers—on the All-County team. They were joined on the All-City squad by seniors Tom Williams at end and Harold Neel at fullback and junior Ray Keck at left halfback. The starting lineup against Waite also included seniors Bob Boldt at center, Bob Kendig at quarterback and Don Bonevich at right halfback and juniors Gordon Young at tackle



and Bill Little at guard. Junior running backs John Criswell and Ted Boldt also played key roles.

The Lions did not start auspiciously. They fumbled the opening kickoff and Waite recovered on the Lincoln 33-yardline. Lincoln held, but was forced to punt and the Indians returned the kick to the Lincoln 9-yardline. However, the Lions recovered

a fumble on the next play at the 3-yardline.

Things began to improve for Lincoln. A 22-yard Keck-to-Neel pass in the second quarter moved the Lions to the Toledo 12-yardline, but a holding penalty killed that drive. Later in the same quarter, Young blocked a punt at the Toledo 28-yardline, but the Lions could not capitalize on it.

In the third quarter, Lincoln moved inside the Waite 20-yardline on a pass, but a lateral attempted after the completion went astray and the visitors recovered it. The most electrifying play of the game came as the third quarter neared an end. Keck raced 56 yards before being pulled down on the Toledo 23-yardline. But the Lions again lost possession on a fumble.

Lincoln drove to the Waite 19-yardline in the final period, but another intercepted pass ended that drive.

The Lions had to settle for a tie on the scoreboard, but the statistics showed they clearly outplayed Waite on the field. Lincoln registered nine first downs to seven for the visitors, and gained 208 total yards to 167. The Lions completed four of 10 passes, while Waite failed to connect on nine attempts.

The celebration that followed was long and loud. The Repository reported that "traffic was snarled on West Tuscarawas Ave., while in the vicinity of Dueber Ave. snake dances and other festivities continued." The Avalon at West Tuscarawas and Dueber, it will be remembered, was the student hangout during the glory days of Lincoln football.

Not only at the Avalon, but throughout Ohio, the Lincoln Lions had made their mark in the world of sports.



## EV DANIELS TREASURES GAME FOOTBALL

Here is **Everett Daniels** holding the football for the championship game of '45, in which the fledgling football team of Canton Lincoln Lions held the champion Toledo Waite scoreless and became co-state champs! Mr. Daniels was assistant principal of Lincoln for its last two years and received the football when the school disbanded. Everett was a biology teacher and track coach for many years at Lincoln, in addition to assistant and later head football coach at Lincoln.



In fact, Mr. Daniels mentioned that for a number of years—from '67 — '73, the Lincoln High School track team had 54 straight wins while he was coaching. He has promised to do an article on this for us in the future. (Dave Wottle, '68 — gold medalist was among his students.)

Everett Daniels was one of our speakers at our January meeting in the Lincoln Band Room. (Mr. Erlitz also spoke and was featured in our first issue.) They were both very entertaining but what impressed this reporter the most was the sincerity of both men and how much they truly cared for their pupils!

Everett Daniels is currently principal of Crenshaw Junior High, where he has been for 11 years. Prior to that, he was assistant principal at both McKinley and Timken High Schools for 2 years, respectively. He is married to Susan Dasco, who is a librarian at McKinley High. They have a four-year-old daughter, Jessica, who attends Westbrook Nursery School. Ev has grown children — a son at Kent Branch, a daughter in computers in Atlanta, and his son, Mike, is head football coach at McKinley High.

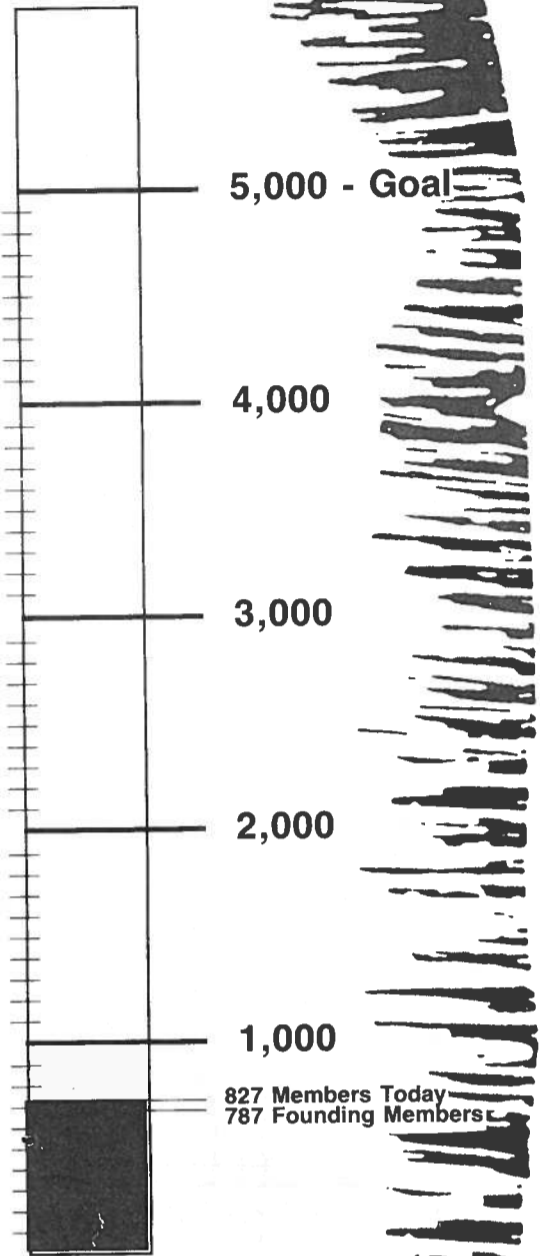

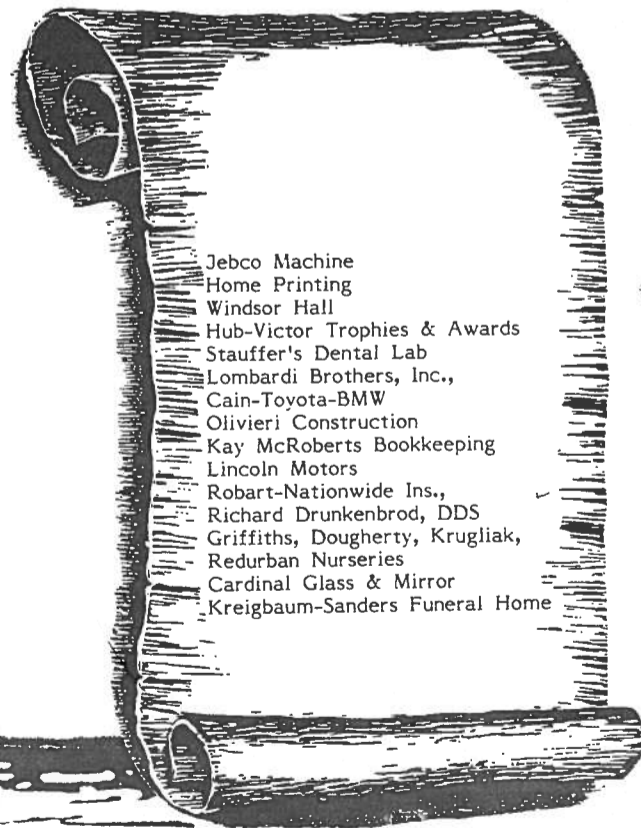

"In Giving, We Receive"—these words bring to mind a special someone to alumni members from Lincoln choirs.

Harry Mason brought his unique talents to Lincoln in 1964, taking the helm from the ever popular Ruth Cogan. Faced with the challenge of continuing the fine traditions begun by Miss Cogan, he brought along not only his expertise and God-given talents, but also his love of music, which was a gift to those of us under his direction.

I recently spent a morning with Harry. There's nothing quite like the anticipation of a favorite former teacher coming to your home. I spent the previous evening cleaning (a good excuse) and the early morning lecturing my three sons on what their behavior should be while this special guest was in our home (also a good excuse to lecture). I wasn't having any anxiety attacks about this visit, I was just very excited to spend some time with this teacher whom I had not really had the chance to talk to in 20 years. The bell rang, I answered the door, and one big bear hug later I was transported back in time. We talked about many things—the Girls' Glee Club he started; "prayer circle" before a performance (it couldn't be called that for long, it had to be changed to "friendship circle"); musicals he directed; those great "Spring Sings" (who could ever forget *I Ain't Down Yet?*); competitions we were in (remember those great bus rides?! We were a real mixture of talent—a few great voices but mostly average singers, the kind who sing in the shower! But what Harry could inspire in us! He demanded 110% and we were happy to give it. There were no primadonnas. Harry believed in having us work together and, thanks to his dedication, Lincoln choirs produced great shows. Rehearsals were something to look forward to. We never dreaded the hours of work it took to put on a first rate performance. Oh, there were some ornery ones in the bunch, and I'm sure we tried his patience many times, but Harry knew how to handle us. A blend of fun, fellowship, and hard work made practice a joy.

I went to the last "Spring Sing" Harry Mason directed at Lincoln High. At the end of the religious music segment Harry invited all alumni choir members on stage to take their old places on the risers and join the choir in singing *The Lord Bless You and Keep You*. What a

## Don Greenham

### Excellence in Teaching and Friendship

"Bonjour, mes amis. Je m'appelle monsieur Greenham." With those words, Don Greenham began my introduction to French, almost thirty years ago. Most of my friends had chosen Spanish as their language requirement at Lincoln; supposedly because it was "easier." After listening to Mr. G. speak entirely in French for over five minutes on that first day, I began to feel there was some truth to that rumor.

But surprisingly, the new language came easy to me. Whether from motivated study efforts, or Don's superb reinforcement of our pronunciations; I'll never know. But it sure felt great to be learning something so radically new. And doing it so well!

Through the years at LHS we learned more than French in his classes. We explored comparative European cultures, dabbled in French literature, and learned about life and what our futures held beyond graduation. We also learned some risqué French drinking songs, which we sang for Mr. Wolfarth as Parisian street sweeping ditties!

We related well to Don as somewhat of a mentor, because he wasn't that much older than us, and yet he was already "worldly." Can you imagine him telling a bunch of west-end baby-boomers about far away places like Wisconsin and the French Riviera? None of us knew where the Mona Lisa was, let alone know someone who had actually seen it.

Out of the classroom, we learned the human side of our teacher. I'll never forget the many times he filled the green Edsel with kids for "road trips" to away football and basketball games. Or the many discussions of life's events—in which our opinions were actually listened to by an adult. Of course, not everyone liked Mr. Greenham. Some students who challenged his playful wit soon found themselves in retreat!

## Valerie Riffle Born

### "I think it's an improvement over the original."

"I think it's an improvement over the original." Thus, the official stamp of approval was given to *Echoes of Lincoln* by one who should know—Valerie Riffle Born, the founder and faculty sponsor of *The Lincoln Echo* from 1937 to 1950. "Also, I feel that naming the alumni paper after the original student one is an honor to me," she added.

Mrs. Born didn't confine her whirlwind energy to the Echo at Lincoln. She was also the founder of the school annual, the *Lionian*, in 1943, and the Forensic League, which won several state prizes. She was the first to produce a Lincoln operetta, an epic called "Pickles." "Of course," she reminded, "we did all our extra-curricular work after school and on weekends in those days and never received one cent extra pay. Mr. Meyer, the principal, used to say 'someday I'd get my reward.'"

The Lincoln years were not the only ones in Mrs. Born's teaching portfolio. In fact, she retired in 1975 from Taft Junior High School and had been at Avondale Elementary School before that. But, she says, "Lincoln was the golden age of teaching for me. Students have changed a lot now. I don't think parents are as strict or spend as much time with their kids as our parents did. Parents encouraged kids to learn when I was teaching."

That doesn't mean she never had any nervous moments at Lincoln. Mrs. Born recalled taking a student queen and her attendants to Waltz Studio in the early '40s for a year-book portrait, when one of the girls said, "I'm dying for a cigarette. Who brought the smokes?" The then "Miss Riffle" turned white. She didn't know any girl ever smoked.

Widowed since 1973, Mrs. Born shares her comfortable Avondale home with two cats, since the death of her beloved Gretchen—a German Shepherd, last July. A son in Las Vegas and a daughter in Florida, plus four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren, give her plenty of reason to travel. But they're not the only reason.

# LOGO WINNER

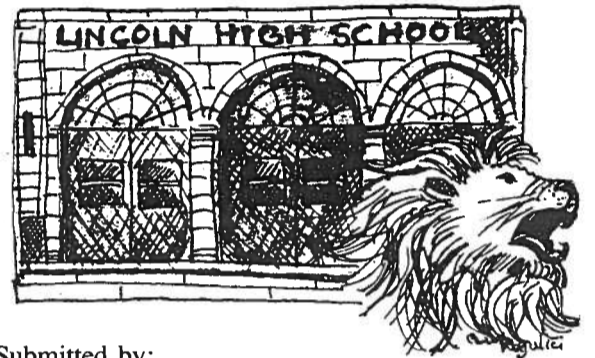

Abraham Lincoln's Birthday

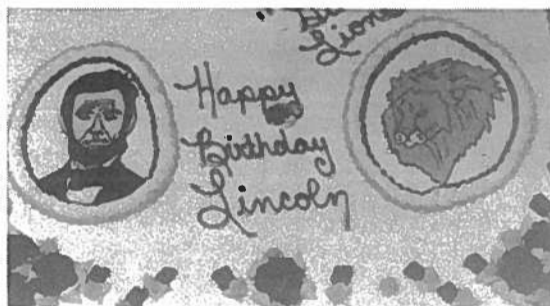


Lorene Weir Goebel '60 and Richard White '57 anticipate the action!

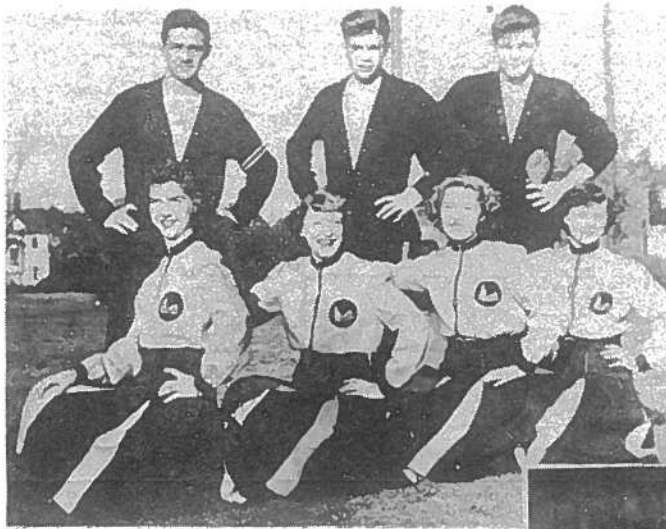
