To Do or Dye at Lincoln High

I was thinking the other day about my freshman year at LHS and the things I learned that year about life and about myself. It was 1958, when father knew best, the Lone Ranger dispatched the bad guys with silver bullets, and no one wondered how an out of work musician named Ozzie managed to live in that nice house on the west coast with no visible means of support.

There were lots of wondrous things to learn. Miss Cogan taught me to sing "What shall I hey-ey today" until every bronchial tube expanded to its full capacity. Mr. Kettering showed me how to stand barefoot on my mother's rolling pin because, "If you take care of your feet, they'll take care of you." And from Mr. Tsarwas I learned to wire a plywood board full of doorbells and lights without electrocuting myself and everyone close to me. All of these things have stayed with me through the years, but the class that taught me the most about myself and life as we know it was Mr. Eakins' public speaking class. Usually you had to be at least a sophomore to take public speaking, but I got special dispensation to take it my freshman year, and being as naive as the average freshie, I took it.

Let me set the stage for you. It was my first day of high school. I had already gotten lost 47 times. The bell had already rung, and I was wandering around a third-floor hall that had been filled with upperclassmen 30 seconds ago. Oh, and I was a typical nerdy 110 pound freshman (ten pounds of which was a pair of horn-rimmed glasses with lenses so thick they were probably bullet proof). Got the picture?

OK. So I walked into class about a minute after everyone else had found a seat. The only desk left was front row center, so the entire class was behind

me. Mr. Eakins welcomed everyone and explained what we would be doing for the next nine months. He then asked each of us to introduce ourselves. Whoa! I had signed up for the class because I was terribly shy and wanted to try to overcome that problem, but I had sure hoped to ease into it. I hadn't planned on really speaking until maybe the second week or so. To make matters worse, as the other folks introduced themselves, I began to realize that I WAS THE ONLY FRESHMAN IN THE CLASS!? My mouth got dry and I could feel my vocal cords constricting as my turn approached.

After I stammered out my introduction, the air seemed to hang thick and heavy like it does just before a summer thunderstorm. There was a low buzz of whispered conversation behind me, and I imagined I could hear that word "freshman" creaking up from the old hardwood floors and echoing off the dusty black chalkboard. After what seemed like an hour, Mr. Eakins called on the next person, and as the rest of the class fumbled through their intros, I began to feel a little less uncomfortable. By the end of the first day, I had almost forgotten that I was a minority of one.

All that changed on the second day, however. That was the day we started to learn about parliamentary procedures. One of our first assignments was to come up with a set of rules for the class. I don't remember who suggested it, but everyone in the class except one voted that all freshmen should wear beanies in class. Guess who the lone hold out was? Yup, you got it. I lost, though, and I wore the @#\$\$%^&! beanie for an entire week before Mr. Eakins decided the joke had gone far enough and suggested repealing the rule. This time, thank god, the vote was unanimous.

When the beanie rule was passed, I wanted to drop the class, but I hung in there. The funny thing is, I didn't die of embarrassment like I thought I would. In fact, by the end of the week upperclassmen that probably would never have spoken to me otherwise told

me that they thought I was a good sport for going along with the gag. It turned out that I had made some friends who helped me get through those first rough weeks of high school and had overcome my shyness at the same time.

I learned a lot about public speaking in that class, too. One day we were studying persuasive dialogues that might be used to sell goods in a commercial or to sell your colleagues on a proposal for a new product or service. It was kind of a lazy day in early spring, and Mr. Eakins was standing at the podium looking over some papers while the latecomers shuffled in and everyone caught up on the latest rumors and gossip. Suddenly Mr. Eakins pounded his fist on the podium, glared at the class and thundered, "You will all die tonight!"

The silence that followed that outburst was so complete that I thought I could hear not only my own heart pounding, but also the hearts of everyone in the room. Mr. Eakins paused a moment while he looked into the eyes of each student in the class and then continued, "Yes, my friends, if you will just try one packet of Mother Fletcher's organic dye, you will all rush home and dye your curtains, sheets and bedspreads this very night." He had made his point. We all understood that in order to sell your audience, you have to get their attention first.

In the years since I graduated from Lincoln, there have been many times that I have had to endure things that at first seemed unendurable. Whenever that happens, I think back to the beanie week in public speaking class, and I realize that things that seem distasteful or unbearable are always temporary. If you just do what has to be done, the time passes quickly, and when it is over, you are stronger or smarter and more able to face future challenges and hardships. I've also put the dye example to good use when I have been in the position of selling a proposal in the face of hostile opposition. Once, however, I used that example too literally. Security was not amused. Ah, but that's another story.

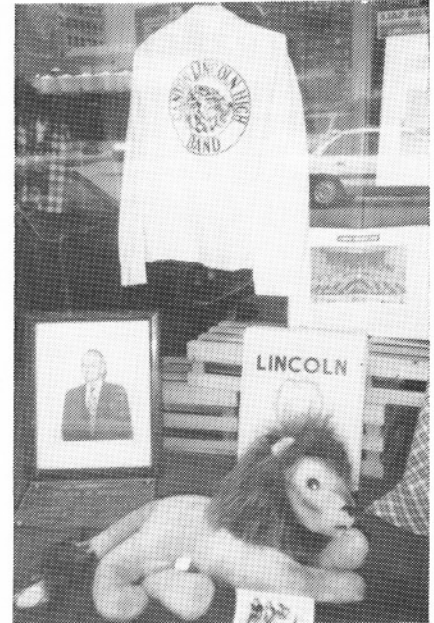

LINCOLN HIGH CENTER OF ATTENTION IN DOWNTOWN CANTON!

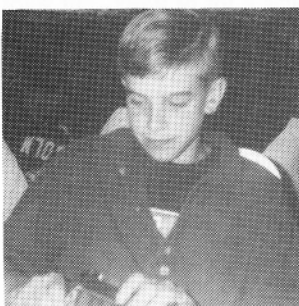
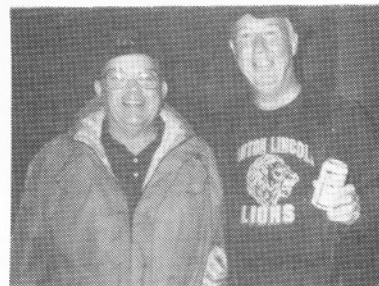

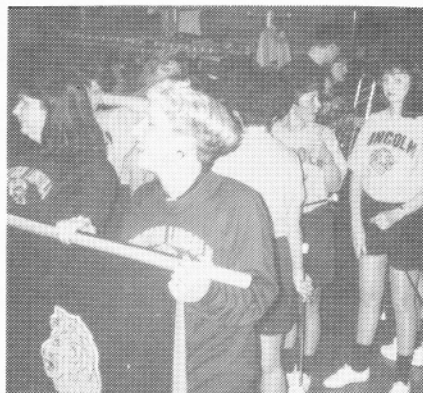

The success of the event was due to the hard work of co-chairmen **Ed Mang** and **Jim "Ozzie" Osborn** and their committee.



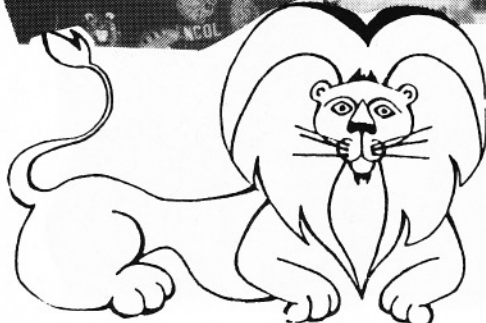
1993 SCHOLARSHIP RAFFLE

CLHSAA 1993 SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The purpose of the Scholarship Committee is to award non-repayable grants to deserving students who either attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School or who are lineal descendants of Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School attendees or graduates who are members of CLHSAA.

The Scholarship Committee shall deny no applicant consideration for a grant because of race, color, creed, religion, sex, or natural origin. All information

supplied by the applicants is strictly confidential with the exception of names, addresses, telephone numbers, and names of parents or relatives who attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School.

The CLHSAA reserves the right to determine the amount and number of grants to be presented in any given year. Only students who expect to attend an accredited school shall be considered. Scholarships are awarded to students who pursue ANY type of post high

school education. Grants are sent directly to each student's school before the beginning of the term.

Any student interested in applying for a CLHSAA grant for the 1993-94 school year should use the application included below. An Awards Reception where presentations are announced is planned for Tuesday, July 27, 1993, 7:00 PM at the Canton Garden Center.

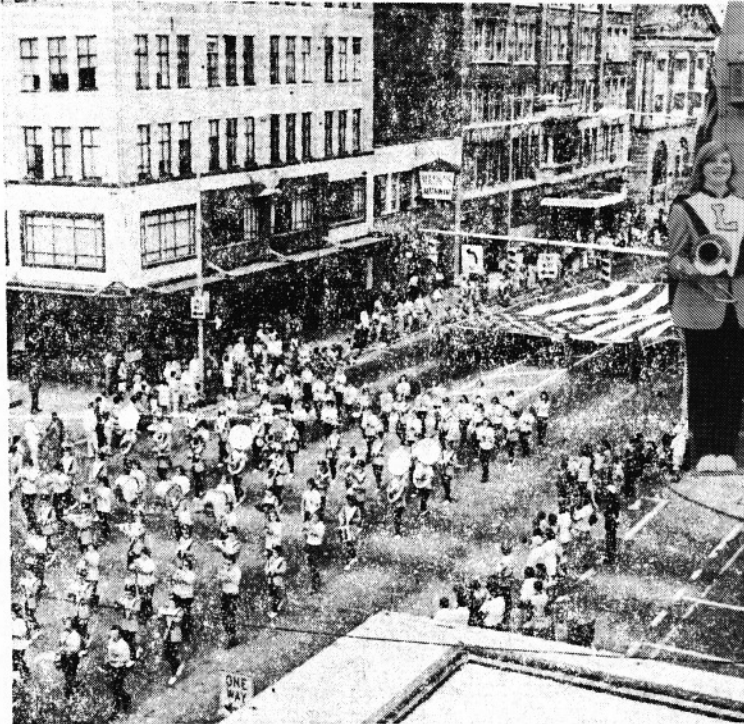

The Lincoln Band has returned! Last year a call went out to Lincoln band alumni and about 60 people responded to re-form the Lincoln Band.

The following is a short history of how the first Lincoln band and orchestra got started as told by Bob White, a member of the first senior high graduating class of Canton Lincoln High School.

I was the first president of the Lincoln band and orchestra when Lincoln was still a junior high school. I started there in 1937. Mr. Elmore Miller was the band director at McKinley High School, and he came to Lincoln to start a band and orchestra on the junior high level. I don't think he put everything he could into it because I think he feared Lincoln becoming a four year school and giving his McKinley band some competition. Just the way he talked, he didn't think Lincoln would ever have a band. I think I told him some day he would eat his words.

Mr. Bob Stump came in 1940 or 1941 and became our first high school band director. Under his direction, the band kept getting better and better. During either my junior or senior year Lincoln was to play McKinley in football. Mr. Miller called Mr. Stump and asked if we wanted to do a combined halftime show with them. About six band members including myself heard about this, and we spread the word. After school Mr. Stump had about one hundred students in his office wanting to know why we couldn't put on our own show. We didn't want Mr. Miller to say we couldn't do our own show and that they had to help us out. (We had a better band anyhow!) Mr. Stump had to call Mr.

Miller and tell him we would do our own halftime show.

About seven of us from the band were also playing with the Floyd Hughes V.F.W. Post 693 Drum and Bugle Corp. The post presented the Lincoln band with its first American flag. During my senior year, we had our first All-City Band Concert at McKinley High School. McKinley, Timken, Lehman, and Lincoln bands were represented. The Lincoln band showed all of them and got a standing ovation. We ran into Mr. Miller afterwards, and I told him he had seen on stage that night the band he thought Lincoln would never have. Mr. Stump was so embarrassed he almost fell through the floor.

Mr. Stump also started the orchestra which was also very good. Then he formed the first swing band, known as the Lionairs. We had a chance to play for dances, but we had no uniforms. So, I took Mr. Stump to the V.F.W. and we borrowed sixteen gold satin shirts to wear. Later on we found some white linen coats. You can see them in the old pictures.

Both of my sons graduated from Lincoln--Tom in 1966 and Mark in 1969. Both played in the band and orchestra. Their mother also graduated in the class of 1943. She played violin in the orchestra and bass drum in the concert band.

I am still a member of the Lincoln Band--the new Lincoln Band. Over 50 years later, I'm still a proud member of the best school band around.

yes, and after I got bounced from TAG English into Ms. Verbeck's "diagramming English grammar as a second language and means of causing mental anguish" class, I remember **Jim Barbour's** moose call reverberating off the hallowed walls. Come to think of it, I still have an album Jim recorded with a group called Chrysalis sometime in the late 60's, I think. I coned **Larry Leno** out of it a couple of decades ago during that time when a lot of us spent most of our time inventing the term "virtual reality." I'm sure some members of the class of '62 will recognize themselves in some of the songs. For the most part, though, the album is harmless, although once during the early 70's I played one of the songs backwards at 78 speed and a lost WWII squadron appeared in my backyard. That may have been more of that virtual reality stuff, though. Anyway, I don't know if this comes under the heading of Lincoln memorabilia, but the CLHSAA is welcome to it, if you think you'd like to have it for the collection.

I think the alumni association is a great idea. Even though I probably spent more of my time at Lincoln watching the clock and waiting for the final bell than anything else, I was kind of sad when I heard that the old school had been disenfranchised by the city and put on the auction block. Wouldn't it be great if the alumni association could raise enough bucks to buy it back? Wishful thinking I guess. Anyway, I'll do my bit to keep the memories of LHS alive by wearing my Lincoln gimme cap here in Austin (an interesting experience in a state where most people still celebrate Confederate Heroes Day), and I anxiously await the arrival of my shiny plastic card. Uh, what did you say the credit limit was on that thing again?

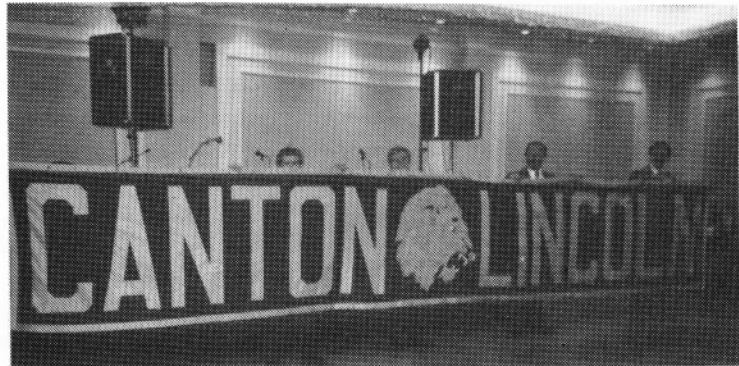

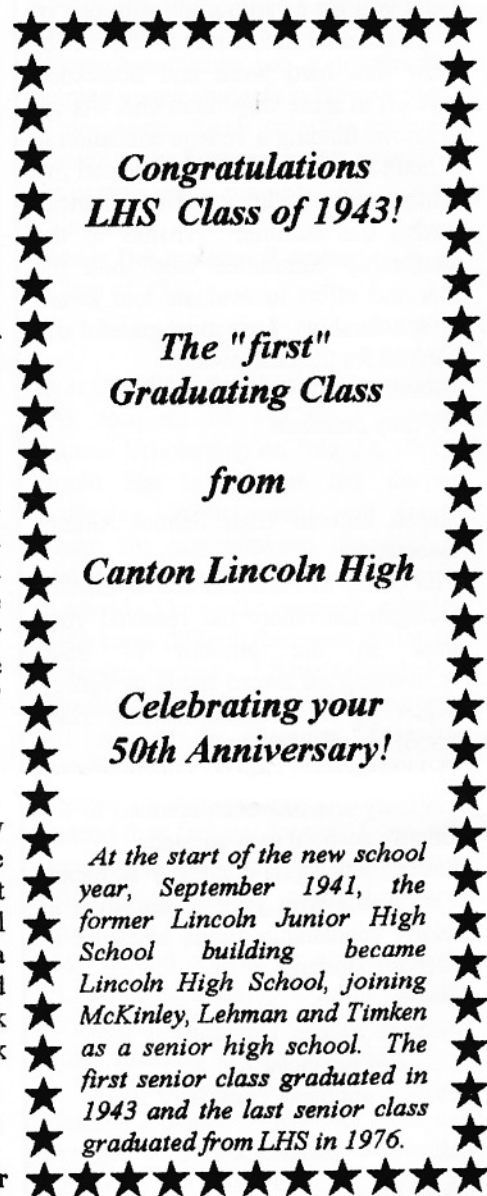
