

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Jim Mitchell '51

The Lincoln Alumni Association continues to grow not only in the number of new memberships but also in the number of additional activities. Under the leadership of our Past President, Jim Osborn, and with the support of board members, several primary goals and projects have been accomplished. These included formation of an alumni band, an annual golf scramble, an all-city night involving McKinley, Timken, and Lehman High School Alumni Associations, and additional revenues for the Lincoln Alumni Association Scholarship Fund.

The Lincoln Band was organized under the direction of Mark Lowe '75 and with the assistance of Trustee Joe Garber '44. The band consists of 50 to 65 members and has generated a great amount of community support. The band marched in the 1993 Hall of Fame Kick-off Parade, Hall of Fame

Grand Parade, and a number of other Stark County parades. They also performed to a standing room only audience at the Stark County Fair and at a concert honoring former Lincoln High School Band Director, A. Jerd Bayless.

The annual golf scramble held at Bob O' Link Golf Course grew from 16 foursomes in 1992 to 21 foursomes in 1993. This event has become so popular it is certain to grow.

All-City Alumni Night, involving all four city school alumni associations, attracted a crowd of close to 200 people. This event was held in the Lincoln High School Auditorium and was hosted by our association. Hopefully, this event will become an annual activity.

Continued membership growth, generous donations, and additional revenue from our fund raising activities enabled us to grant 25 scholarships totaling \$12,500 to children or grandchildren of Lincoln High School alumni.

With the completion of another successful Scholarship Raffle in February, plans are moving along well for 1994. The addition this year of a Summer Event along with our other regular events promises to make 1994 an exciting year for the Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association.

As your new president, I will do whatever I can to make certain that the association continues to grow and be the best of all the alumni associations in Stark County.

# GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY CONCERT HONORS BAYLESS

Recently, looking through my father's 1946 Lionian, I marveled at the number of Lincoln faculty members whose names I became familiar with two decades later: Margaret Charles Andrews, Atchison, Ruth Cogan, Charles Forrest, Helen Gatchel, Carlton Gowdy, Leon Hildebrand, Arabella Hopkins, Lester Kettering, Ester Puterbaugh, Malvern Randels. Veda Rensch, Lester Scherff, and William Wolfarth. I was privileged (but didn't always consider it such at the time) to know several of them personally. This article may well have been written about any of these outstanding educators. All deserve to be honored for their many years of dedication and teaching. However, my subject is the teacher I know best (then and now), the gentleman who for twenty-seven years served as instructor of instrumental music at Lincoln. The man whose name over past became fifty vears synonymous with music education in the greater Canton area.


A. Jerd Bayless came to Canton Lincoln in 1943, replacing R. Donald Stump when Mr. Stump entered the military. Mr. Bayless graduated from Ohio State University in 1935 and taught music at schools in Gallipolis, Wellston, and Fostoria before coming to Canton. Throughout his career at Lincoln, his bands were known state wide as models of excellence. In 1967 the School of Music at Kent State University named Bayless' band "Ohio Band of the Year." In May of that same year, the national "School Musicians" magazine named them "Band of the Month."

In addition to his role as Lincoln band director, Mr. Bayless kept busy as a member of the Canton Symphony Orchestra, conductor and conductor for several area community bands, and as private instructor. During his last years at Lincoln, he was supervisor of instrumental music for the Canton City School system. After retiring in 1970, he taught at Kent State University's Salem branch and at Malone College where he organized and conducted the Malone College Community Band. That same year, the mayor of Canton honored Mr. Bayless by proclaiming February 14 as "A. Jerd Bayless Day." He was honored again in 1986 with a resolution by the Canton City Council recognizing continuing community contributions.

On September 26, 1993, the latest in a long list of honors was bestowed upon our former band director with a special "A. Jerd Bayless Golden Anniversary Celebration Concert." The Kent Stark College Community Concert Band was joined on the stage of our alma mater by the Lincoln Alumni Band to present a program celebrating Mr. Bayless' fifty years as part of the Canton music community. Under the batons of Dr. Patricia Ann Grutzmacher, Robert Resseger, and Mr. Bayless, the bands played a series of numbers of special significance to Mr. Bayless and to Canton Lincoln. In addition to the alumni performing in the band, two additional Lincoln bandsmen were featured. Robert E. Resseger appeared as guest conductor, and "Louie" Mattachione '57 served as Master of Ceremonies.

After intermission, the guest of honor took the podium for the remainder of the program.

Throughout the concert, Mr. Mattachione's program notes paid tribute to Mr. Bayless' career, his achievements, and his character. He noted that A. Jerd Bayless had year after year instilled a sense of pride, commitment and dedication in his students. Mr. Bayless accepted the accolades with his customary modesty and was persuaded to make some

remarks in his own behalf. overcame his legendary shyness to relate anecdotes of Mr. Resseger, who as a bass drummer in the Lincoln band was able to maintain a steady beat "only because he steadfastly refused to ever look at me!" He told how Mr. Mattachione "attended every rehearsal...darn it!" And he told how he never began to worry until he saw Louie "...start to put the reed on his saxophone." The program closed with a standing ovation for this wonderful teacher, musician, and human being.

#### A LINCOLN SALUTE--A BAYLESS TRIBUTE

"Louie" Mattachione '57

The excitement and enthusiasm was electrifying in our old Lincoln High School Auditorium that Sunday as several hundred alumni and friends gathered to reminisce, honor, and pay tribute to a giant of a man who was a part of a great tradition at Lincoln High School.

A. Jerd Bayless was honored for his fifty years of music involvement in the Canton community and at Lincoln High School in particular. It was my honor to serve as Master of Ceremonies for the festivities. The editors asked me to share some of my remarks from that day for reprinting.

[Editor's Note: The following paragraphs are excerpts from the introductions and anecdotes as presented by "Louie."]

For 27 years a man called Bayless held the baton that led and directed the fabled and honored group that we remember as the great Canton Lincoln Lion Marching Band. Thousands of young people were directed, controlled, touched, and loved by this man. His voice was the voice of authority. His direction was the touch of the master. His leadership played the role of teacher. But in all of his roles, the one shining element that always came to light was his demand for professionalism. A. J. Bayless was a pro.

We gather to pay tribute to that professionalism. We want to honor the teacher, the master, the director. What better way to salute a "Bayless" than to have a concert. What better way to have a concert for Bayless than to play some of the great music that he loved and directed.

One musical feature will have a special meaning to the many Canton Lincoln Alumni in our audience. Your heart may pound a little faster, the excitement may cause your blood pressure to rise a point or two because within the notes of "The New Colonial March" you will be able

to pick out those familiar strains that we loved and cheered to as the Lincoln High School Fight Song.

After intermission, Louie had the privilege of taking care of some special business--

With your permission I should like to read and convey a part of a recent proclamation: "Be it resolved that I, Richard D. Watkins, Mayor of The City of Canton, Ohio on the 26th of September 1993 do hereby commend: A. Jerd Bayless...And urge all citizens to publicly join with me in according him the respect, honor and admiration he so richly deserves." Signed...Richard D. Watkins, Mayor of Canton.

What a treat we have in store for you...the "Boss" himself will take over the baton and direct the combined bands in musical numbers that will certainly sound familiar to many Lincoln followers.

While our own Jerd Bayless was a student at Ohio State University one of his room mates was Mr. Clare Grundman. Theirs was a true and long lasting friendship. In 1956 Mr. Grundman wrote a musical treat that he entitled "Holiday" and inscribed on the manuscript was a dedication passage. Composer Clare Grundman dedicated his work to A.J. Bayless and the Lincoln High School Band.

It was the music that Bayless selected for football pre-game. It was the music that Bayless used for parades. It was the music that almost became the trade-mark of the Canton Lincoln Lion Marching Band. If you listen carefully you might still hear the screams and cheers of the thousands of Lincoln fans as they stood on Elgin Avenue near the McKinley Monument as they watched their maroon and gold of the Lincoln Band rounding the corner blaring out the strains of .... "Oh the monkey wrapped his tail around the flag pole." That was Lincoln music, that was Bayless music, that was the "National Emblem March."

And now the song that holds special meaning not only to Bayless but to

the thousands and thousands of Lincoln alumni. Let's watch as Bayless takes the baton to direct the Lincoln Band in the golden strains of the Lincoln High School Alma Mater.

Our celebration is quickly coming to an end. We have gathered in this hall to reminisce, to acknowledge, and to give a special word of thanks to the man of the hour. A man who symbolizes the triumphs and musical shrewdness that was the Canton Lincoln High School Band. All who crossed his path found their journey a little easier and certainly more rewarding.

For his fifty years of caring and sharing in not only our musical lives but our personal lives, we say thank you. To the director, to the teacher, to the master, to "Bayless" we say...."Thanks for the memories. Thanks for being you!" May God bless you and keep you in good health and spirits for many, many more musical years.

And so we conclude our program with the best way possible, with Augustus Jerd Bayless directing the band in playing the Lincoln High School Fight Song. Thank you and good afternoon.

Friends and well wishers personally greeted Mr. Bayless after the concert. One former student, Eleanor Mizer Yoder '53, summed it up, "It was an exciting afternoon of wonderful music and renewed acquaintances. All who attended went home with a warm feeling that some memories CAN be revisited."

Mr. Bayless was featured in an article in the Monday, September 20, 1993 edition of The Repository. It is worth reading. Gary Brown titled his article "Lincoln's Music Man." That certainly says it all.

paved the way to successfully tackle future challenges, both academic and personal.

Miss Arabella Hopkins focused tenth graders with various abilities and degrees of interest into an attentive class that followed her hand on the blackboard like children today concentrate on a video game. In a lovely, soft-spoken voice, she taught her geometry students to think in a clear, defining way. Years later. whether refining the thrust of a term paper or examining a real estate contract, Miss Hopkins' students could thank her for developing in them an understanding of exactness.

When Miss Olga Lenz closed the door to Spanish I or II, not a word of English was spoken. A pair of piercing blue eyes accompanied by a gentle. no-nonsense demeanor allowed no excuse for unpreparedness in "el vocabulario." There was no sarcasm, there were no threats, but to hear her unexpectedly say, "Senorita Pajarita" withered the soul. One knew she had been caught by an expert. A class under the persistent but irreplaceable Miss Lenz taught adolescents to be prepared to know the answers in order to meet the expectations of a lifetime. She taught her students to focus on preparedness.

Whenever I'm tempted to be skeptical of a movie's value, a book's depth, or even the merit of a new experience, I think of Miss Pearl Staudt. Who ever opened a Latin I text expecting it to titillate or to be even slightly interesting? Who really cared if "Omnia Gallia" was "tres divida?" Somehow Pearl Staudt made me care. I really did! I don't know how that skilled linguist turned a dusty, unused language into a favorite for many; but she did. What gratitude we still feel when we are challenged by unknown words and are able to detect their meaning through the roots, prefixes, and suffixes that we were forced to learn in Latin class by a determined Miss Staudt. She was not interested in being popular. Instead, her no-nonsense philosophy gave us a gift for a lifetime. Her focus was on the future of those she touched.

No one demanded greater self discipline, total undistracted attention, more refined listening skills than did the renowned choir director Miss Ruth Cogan. Within her clear, blue, determined eyes and the tight direction of her expressive hands, lay the control of a monarch. oncoming sneeze, no lapse of lyrical memory must ever be detected by her. All thought and energy had to be focused on this one diminutive woman and to tuning to the surrounding voices. No student of Ruth Cogan could ever fail to appreciate her legacy of exceptional artistic and musical training, the ability to concentrate, and the ability to listen.

If immortality lay in what a mentor imparts to others--which eventually becomes part of their character, then the focus of four very sagacious women must make them truly immortal. Arabella Hopkins, Olga Lenz, Pearl Staudt, and Ruth Cogan will forever be part of those of us whose lives they touched.

#### MUSINGS FROM HAWAII Ann Lee Reed '50

If you're looking for an "echo" of Lincoln, you can't go much farther in the United States for a resounding reply unless there's a grad somewhere in the Aleutians of Alaska. I've been back to Canton for only three reunions, and my solitary distinction was the "traveled the greatest distance" award. I'm flattered that you invited me to write a few words, and if my muse hasn't gone surfing, I'll give it a try.

After living so long in the Hawaiian Islands, I didn't know that Lincoln High School no longer existed...except in spirit. I commend the organization that has kept that wonderful school spirit alive. The maroon plastic alumni card is very impressive. (So far it hasn't gotten me any privileges in Waikiki!) Of all

the many activities and worthy projects the alumni association has created, I'm most impressed by the scholarships. What better gift from one generation to another?

Two things that I'm proud of from my high school days: first, that I was the founding student and first president of the Future Teachers of America at Lincoln; and second, that I had a regular column in the school paper. Both were fortuitous. After teaching for fifteen years, I returned to college to study journalism, and for the past ten years I have been writing and producing educational television for the PBS affiliate in Honolulu. I owe a debt of gratitude Lincoln journalism teacher Valerie Born and to the entire football team. What's that you say? The hunky, macho football team of Lincoln High School? Yes, they mercifully spared my life after I went to each of their mothers and got their cute little baby picture and published them in my column!

There's a quote that says, "In youth we learn; in age we understand." Regardless of whether we became what we dreamed, or we discovered another direction, or Fate dealt us a bad hand, the memories of the Class of '50 are precious. And as we age, we understand how important happy memories are. If I were given the assignment, I couldn't write a better scenario of my high school days. Thanks for giving me the chance to say so. ## "FOCUS ON THE FORTIES"

To the Lincoln Alumni:

The 50th class reunion of the first graduating class of Lincoln High School was held October 9-11, 1993. I was unable to attend, but I sent this letter to my classmates to be read at our reunion. I would like to share it with your newsletter readers.

TO THE CLASSMATES WITH WHOM I GRADUATED FROM LHS IN 1943,

As I sit here, my classmates, I can hear the honking of the geese overhead. I wish you could all be here to watch the sun rise this morning on the beauty of rural America. #### Oh Boy! Those Boy Cheerleaders! Carole Hunker Hughes '51

In the beginning, Lincoln had boy cheerleaders. Checking back through the annuals, there they were grinning at me from the pages of the <u>Lionians</u> in the years 1943-1950. They were all cute and fresh-faced. There were usually three girls and three boys on a cheerleading squad.

I thought this might be interesting to delve into, so I called Ken Coates, Class of 1944, who was there from the start. Ken said he was a cheerleader all four of his high school years. It seems "way back then" most high schools had boy cheerleaders. Ken related that his first uniform consisted of blue pants and a gold sweater. (Lincoln's colors were blue and gold until Timken High School was built. Then, after some shuffling, we became the maroon and gold.) After that, the boys had maroon satin pants with a gold stripe down the side and the gold sweater. The pants were extremely cold, said Ken, and eventually someone must have taken pity on them, and they were outfitted in wool pants. Ken tried out for cheerleader because he didn't make the basketball team, and he was too small for football. Being a cheerleader guaranteed him free admittance to the games and a seat on the bus for out of town contests.

Next I decided to find out about the end of the era, so I called the last boy cheerleader Lincoln had. mentioned writing this article to Dick some time ago, and he said that not everyone knew he had been a cheerleader and that it would be fine with him if it were left that way. Dick remembered being approached by a friend on the squad who urged him to try out. He thought it might be fun, and like Ken, did it for the free admittance and a bus seat to away games. In 1950, boys' interests in being cheerleaders evidently waned, as no one showed up for tryouts. Dick was made cheerleader manager

his senior year. His job consisted mainly of shouting through the megaphone to the crowd what cheers were going to be led next and leading cheers along with the girls. And so, like Lincoln High School itself some twenty-five years later, that was the end of an era. But rest assured, **Dick Carpenter**, Class of 1951, your secret is safe with me.


