THIRTY SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED IN 1997

The phenomenal success of Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association can be measured by the amount of scholarship money awarded to deserving students. In 1997, CLHSAA awarded \$15,000 in scholarships, bringing the total to \$100,300 awarded over the last eight years. Truly unbelievable.

On July 15, 1997 seventeen incoming freshmen and thirteen current college students were each awarded \$500 scholarships at a reception at Mayfield Senior Center. One recipient is a Lincoln graduate who is working on her master's degree, while the others are lineal descendants of CLHSAA members.

Congratulations to these fine young men and women. We are proud to have helped such bright, talented students to pursue their educational goals. Even though our scholarships are not large, more than one recipient remarked that "every little bit helps" when meeting college expenses.

A special thank you to all who applied for a 1997 scholarship. We wish we could have assisted every one of you. Please remember, you are eligible to apply again. You have our sincere best wishes for your continued academic success.



The main reason for the Association's existence is to provide scholarships to LHS alumni and their relatives. In 1997, we

awarded 30 scholarships totaling \$15,000. This means that, since 1990, 202 scholarships have been awarded totaling \$100,300.00!! (Not bad for a school that has been closed for 22 years!) Every one of us should be proud of this outstanding accomplishment! Scholarship money is raised through the hard work and the generosity of our alumni. The sources of scholarship income include proceeds from the November Dance, the February Raffle, the August Golf Scramble, the sale of souvenirs, membership funds, and many direct donations.

At our General Meeting in September 1997, we honored seven of our own with the Alumni Service Award--a biennial award presented to those members who have shown outstanding service and dedication to CLHSAA. 

1968 - 1998 30th ANNIVERSARY CITY TRACK CHAMPIONS

Thirty years ago the Lincoln High School track team, under the direction of coach **Ev Daniels**, did what the other city schools could not do: beat McKinley for the All-City Track Championship. (It was the first time ever that McKinley lost the championship.) The 1968 Lincoln track team was made up of a lot of quality young people. The most notable runner was a tall, skinny kid named **Dave Wottle '68** who went on to be All-City, All-County, and All-Ohio Athlete. Then he went on to star at Bowling Green State University. Four years later, Dave won a Gold Medal in the 1972 Olympics.

The 1968 team showed greatness from the first day of practice. They were exceptional in the field events and great in the running events. The City Championship came down to the mile relay. Each of four runners had to run 440 yards with a

baton handoff between each runner. All were great handoffs, and each of the first three runners stayed even with the front runners until the final handoff to Wottle. The McKinley runner was about five yards ahead of Wottle until the last 100 yards when Wottle turned on his famous kick in the final heat, passed the McKinley runner, and won the relay by 10 yards.

At the first banquet ever held for Lincoln Spring sports, all varsity track members were awarded championship trophies. Dave Wottle was also awarded the Ohio State Championship trophy. What a great season. As Bob Hope always said when closing his program, "Thanks for the memories." Congratulations to all the athletes of the great '68 Lincoln Championship Track Team.

DAVE WOTTLE Lincoln Track Champ

Over 25 years ago, **Dave Wottle '68** won a Gold Medal in the 800-meter race in the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich, Germany. After his win, Dave returned to Bowling Green State University, graduated in 1973, served his ROTC commitment in the military, tried pro track for two years, and quit running "cold turkey" in 1975. In 1975 Dave returned to Canton to coach cross country at Walsh College. He became its Director of Admissions and started their track team in 1976. He left Walsh in 1977 to become coach at Bethany College in West Virginia. He later became Bethany's Dean of Admissions and stopped coaching. In 1983 he took an administration position at Rhodes College in Memphis, Tennessee.

Today Dave is Dean of Admissions and Financial Aid at Rhodes, and his interest in track meets is limited to that of an observer. He and his wife, Jan, have one daughter and two sons. He enjoys golf, basketball, and family outings.

His trademark golf cap is in the Track and Field Hall of Fame at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, where Dave is also enshrined.

Regarding memories of his winning the Gold Medal, Dave has been quoted as saying, "The Olympics, the race, the gold medal--it is something that, as you get older, you realize just how special that moment was." The cap and the kick are also a part of the lore of Lincoln High School, and Dave Wottle will always be a special golden memory to Lincoln sports fans. []

Mr. FORREST Coach, Teacher, Gentleman

Chuck Forrest and Junie Ferrall graduated from McKinley High School in 1929. At age seventeen, Mr. Forrest went on to attend Cornell University. Returning to Canton, he his teaching began career at Wells Elementary School where he taught for two years. Then he took a teaching position at McKinley High School for five years. In 1942, he had the opportunity to take a teaching

position at Lincoln Junior High School. Junie Ferrell had been coaching football and basketball at Lincoln, and he asked Mr. Forrest to take the head coaching position in basketball.

It was at this time that Lincoln became a senior high school. Thus, Mr. Forrest was the first head basketball coach at Lincoln High School. He taught Commerce and Industry while coaching. He also assisted Junie in football, and he became an excellent scout for the two sports. He was very punctual and very organized in all that he did. In his later years, he became Athletic Administrator. In 1960, Mr. Forrest designed and created All-City Night of Basketball. All-City Nights were played in Memorial Field House from 1960 until 1976 when Lincoln and Lehman were discontinued as high schools.

Teacher, coach, innovator, athletic administrator, official-Chuck Forrest has been all of these and more. He is a gentleman of the highest integrity and a model for all who would instruct and lead the youth of today. Chuck and his lovely wife, Eleanor, were married in December 1941. They have one child, Pamela Miller, who lives in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Chuck and Eleanor still reside in Canton, so when you see him around, be sure to stop and say hello.

Those of us who attended Lincoln High School and were privileged to know him want to say, "Thank you, Mr. Forrest, for your instruction--but more than that, for being such a caring person and a real gentleman." []

for 15 minutes, and then shoot it. Not really very complicated, now is it?

Most of this is as true as I can remember it...Mr. Newlon was one great guy to play for and, just as important, was a great math teacher. He and Mrs. Newlon are two of the finest people you can know and were just another reason why Lincoln High School was so special. []

EDITOR'S NOTE: Ken Newlon retired from teaching in 1981 and lives in Perry Township with his wife, Betty. He was head boys basketball coach at Lincoln from 1956 through the school's closing in 1976. He coached the Lions to the state final four in 1962 and 1967 and compiled a record of 306-121. He finished his career with five seasons at McKinley, posting a 97-21 mark. His teaching career spanned 34 years. Mr. Newlon also was an outstanding football official for 27 seasons, retiring from officiating in 1983. These days he spends time with his and Betty's eight grandchildren and on the golf course. []

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is from a letter written by Miss DeMuesy to CLHSAA Trustee, Faye Staugh:

You said you needed some data to establish my tie with Lincoln High. As a child, I was an average performer in dance recitals on the Lincoln stage, which was rented for an annual revue. After

graduating from Northwestern University in 1948, I began my stint as a feature writer at *The Repository*. I tried to refuse one of my first assignments. Who would want to attend a high-school musical program and write a critical review? Not me! I had better things to do with my time! But, I was told *The Rep only* "covered" Lincoln's choral programs, and that was what I was to do. I did. I was flabbergasted, and, within a few years, I decided that if Miss Ruth Cogan could find that talent in choral music, I would teach journalism in that same school. Thus began my years at Lincoln, first as a substitute and then full time in the Fall of 1951. I continued free lancing for several newspapers all those Lincoln years.

The *Lincoln Echo* staff was flimsy at first--too many students who took journalism to avoid fourth year English! We slapped on a requirement of 85 average in English to enroll in journalism and perhaps the chance to work on the *Echo* staff. Within three years, we had a first in state award for editorial and second in the nation for a school our size. While I turned in the summertime to advertising as a creative career, I yet volunteered and continued "without pay" at Lincoln from 1954 through 1964 when Miss Cogan retired. I was privileged to

work with her students and with her genius as we did her final decade of Christmas, Lenten, and May Fiestas.

When I received the North Canton High School Alumni Award of Distinction in September 1997, perhaps the warmest thrills of the evening were wrapped in memories of Lincoln. First, **John Hayward '64**, North Canton Hoover choir director, and his students performed "The Old Routine," which I had brought from Northwestern to Lincoln those many years ago. Another thrill that evening, a wonderful Lincoln Alumni coffee mug filled with many memories surprisingly at my place at the head table.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Miss DeMuesy, a 1944 graduate of North Canton High School, became a journalist, teacher, owner of an advertising agency, and author. She is active in church and community affairs and resides in North Canton. []

WADE LESSIG '44 Graduate, Educator, Friend

Wade D. Lessig graduated from Lincoln High School in 1944, spent two years in the U.S. Air Force, returned to attend Kent State University, and graduated with a degree in education. Wade began his teaching career at Avondale Elementary School where he taught for three years. In 1957 he changed to Cedar Grade School in Canton, a school he had attended as a youngster when his family lived on Wertz Avenue, S.W. Then in 1961, he returned to Lincoln High School as an English teacher. He spent the next 14 years on the faculty at LHS until the school closed in 1976.

Lincoln High School was important part of Wade's life. As a student there he was a fine athlete, participating in and receiving varsity letters both football and basketball. He married another Lincolnite, Sally Bordner '46. The opportunity return to Lincoln as a teacher and coach



was an exciting time in his life. He served as an assistant to Kenny Newlon, helping to guide the Lincoln basketball team to some of the most successful years in the school's history.

Wade's real love, in addition to his wife Sally and children Jeff, Matt, and Leslie, was teaching and working with young people. Although he taught all areas of English, he had a passion for making his students

appreciate the great American novel "Moby Dick." His devotion to this Herman Melville classic often led to some good-natured kidding by his students. They would refer to Wade as "Ahab," the central character in the novel and would give him pictures and other items depicting the "great white whale."

When Lincoln closed in 1976, Wade moved to McKinley High where he completed 31 years of teaching in 1984. Wade spent his retirement years playing golf, fishing, and enjoying his grandchildren. He never lost his passion for literature and spent much of his time reading. He especially enjoyed biographies of famous Americans. He served as the President of the NFL Hall of Fame Luncheon Club in Canton and stayed active with the Lincoln Alumni Association. He helped coach the Lincoln Alumni Team to three victories in the revival of All-City Night at the Canton Fieldhouse.

Wade passed away in October 1997. His former students had a great appreciation for the impact that Wade had on their lives. The following is from a letter from **Beth Anderson**, sent to Wade's wife, Sally, following his death:

"I was a student of Mr. Lessig's at Lincoln during the late 1960's. Without a doubt he was one of my favorite teachers. I thought he was one of the most fascinating people I knew. In retrospect, I know part of the reason so many of us were crazy about him was because we knew he genuinely cared for us. In his English class, I learned a real appreciation for literature, specifically the early American poets. His influence has continued in my memory until this day, and I'll be forever thankful for what I learned from him."

Wade devoted his adult life to the area of education and being a positive influence on the many young people with which he came in contact. In all ways he personified the term "a gentleman and a scholar." Wade Lessig exemplified the "spirit of Lincoln High School" in every way. He is missed. []

George Copeland -- Lion Star 1939-1997

George Copeland '57 was a humble superstar who won ten varsity letters at Lincoln High School in the period 1955-1957. George's sports career started at Baxter Grade School. Their basketball team won the city grade school championship. George was the high scorer.

Unique in Lion history, he played four positions in varsity football. He was the middle linebacker in a 7 diamond defense; but he also played quarterback, halfback, and offensive end. He was chosen for these positions because he was not only a gifted athlete, but smart, unselfish, and hard working. I never remember him relaxing.

George was also a modest, good-natured star. He never got angry, he was always calm. During the 1956 basketball season, Lincoln was in a close game at the field house. With a few seconds left at halftime, George shot the ball from behind the mid-court line. The ball went in the basket and thousands cheered--everyone but George. He jogged quietly back to the bench--never even cracking a smile!

At our 40th Reunion a few months ago, George showed his sense of humor when we joked about our experiences at Lincoln. George was a loyal, caring, compassionate man who showed his kindness to others daily. As a tribute to George, his funeral was packed-hundreds stood in the rain to pay tribute to this outstanding Lion. Peggy, his children, and grandchildren can be truly proud of George Copeland. 
