Again in 1998, Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association was able to award scholarships to deserving alumni and lineal descendents of CLHSAA members. Twenty-six \$500 scholarships were awarded, bringing our grand total for nine years to \$113,300. What a remarkable record!

Scholarships were given to 11 incoming freshmen and 15 current college students. Of those, two were graduates of Lincoln High School. For the first time, we had a pair of recipients who are mother and daughter. Four dedicated scholarships were given in 1998. The mother-daughter pair received the two Carol Berg Marvin (Class of 1960) Memorial Scholarships\*\*\*. Two other students were awarded scholarships honoring LHS Class of 1965\* and LHS Class of 1968\*\*.

## **ED MANG -- Friend & Founder**

A true friend who is going to be missed by many, many people in this community passed away last August. Ed Mang, class of '51, was a life resident of Canton who owned and

operated Mang's Corner Variety Shoppe on 11th Street SW for the past 36 years. The unofficial "mayor of the southwest end," Ed was well known and well loved and will be long remembered for the many acts of kindness he extended so willingly.

Ed is survived by his wife, Nancy Vannorsdall Mang, former LHS teacher; his daughter, Lynne; and son, Robert; their spouses; and three grandchildren. Lynne and her husband, Rudy Perez, continue to operate the store.

Ed originated our annual day-after Thanksgiving dances twelve years ago. He held the first dance at the old Nazir Grotto Hall, and it drew so many people that it became the

foundation from which the alumni association was created. But, as was so often the case, Mang never took credit for his idea. Jim "Ozzie" Osborn, one of Mang's longtime

friends, said, "He liked to stand in the background. He'd do anything you asked for and not say a word about it." Chip Conde agreed, "I don't think he ever said 'no' to anyone when it came to a Lincoln function." Lehman alumnus, Mary K. Wenger, called Ed "a mainstay of the Lincoln Alumni." As the sign reads, Ed will be greatly missed by everyone who knew him.

### CLHSAA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The purpose of the Scholarship Committee is to award non-repayable grants to deserving students who are either graduates, attendees, or descendents of Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School. Descendents include child(ren), grandchild(ren), great-grandchild(ren), step-child(ren), adopted child(ren), or spouse of attendees or graduates who are **paid members** of CLHSAA for the **current** calendar year. If the applicant's **only** lineal Lincoln ancestor is deceased, then the paid membership requirement is waived.

The Scholarship Committee will consider all applicants for grants regardless of race, color, creed, religion, sex, or national origin. All information supplied by applicants is strictly confidential with exception of names, addresses, telephone numbers, and names of ancestors who attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School.

CLHSAA reserves the right to determine the amount and number of grants to be presented in any year. Scholarships are awarded to students who are pursuing ANY type of post high school education at any type of accredited school, i.e. college, junior college, technical, or trade schools. Checks are made payable to each student's school. An Awards Reception where presentations are announced and recipients honored is held in July.

1999 scholarship application forms were mailed in January along with membership renewal forms.

The deadline for 1999 applications was March 15, 1999.

Students interested in applying for a 2000 CLHSAA grant should watch for a scholarship application form which will be included with 2000 membership renewal forms to be mailed in January 2000.

## **OUR TEACHERS** .

### ARABELLA HOPKINS

Avalon Taylor Schneider '46

Teachers' rewards come in different forms; and, for Miss Arabella Hopkins, proof that you've made a difference is sweet indeed. The Christmas message to Miss Hopkins from former student General James McCarthy '53, now a professor at the Air Force Academy, stated, "I still think of you often and the impact you made on my life. Now I hope to do the same for others."



Miss Hopkins retired from Canton Lincoln in 1975 with 36 years of service, all but eight of them at Lincoln. During that time, she saw few changes in the teaching of algebra and plane geometry, her areas of expertise, and found troublemakers among her thousands of Miss students. Hopkins emphatically maintained, "I don't think the personalities of the students were

any less attractive when I retired than when I started. The people of the Southwest end of Canton were sensible and wanted their children to do their best." She also credited support from principals William Wolfarth and Carl Meyer, whose secretary was her sister, for keeping discipline problems minimal.

However, Miss Hopkins does see a great deal of difference in how girls are now perceived in math and science classes. Although she's 88 years old, Miss Hopkins still showed great indignation when she stated, "When I went to college, girls were discriminated against. In math and science labs, the profs went to the boys' desks, and we were ignored. Thank goodness that has changed, although we're still not on equal footing." She mentioned that teachers are now maintaining that girls are harder workers in class, but she explains that boys never were smarter than girls; they were just considered to be. Still indignant, she animatedly described how her feminist fifth grade teacher described to the class the treatment women received while fighting for the vote. "When women went to meeting, men threw stones at them and hit them with sticks. In religious meetings, women sat out in the hall while men discussed business."

Other phases of teaching have certainly changed since Miss Hopkins started her career. Her beginning salary was under \$100 a month, and no engaged or married women were hired. She said, "Teachers were submissive in my day. We didn't fight for our rights in those days."

### GLEN DIERINGER

Teacher, Counselor, Adventurer


Glen Dieringer was a teacher at Lincoln High School from 1958 - 1963. After spending 31 years (28 years as a school counselor) in the Canton City Schools, he retired in 1989. His assignments besides Lincoln were at Timken, "old McKinley" (11 years), Souers, and Crenshaw Junior High School (his last 11 years). While at Lincoln, Mr. Dieringer taught several history courses, health education, driver education; and he was a guidance counselor part of the day for several years. Due to being in the military service, he was 27 years old before he started teaching. Lincoln was his first teaching assignment. Mr. Dieringer submitted the following article about his time at Lincoln and his life today.

"I truly loved my experience at Lincoln. It's how one feels for his or her first born child. I can recall many fond memories of the students and staff there. I always looked forward to the football and basketball seasons, school plays, band events, traveling with the debate team and pep rallies. All school functions were a very important part of my life.

It is difficult to comprehend that I have been retired for ten years. Occasionally I see some of my former students who

are either close to retirement or are also retired. It's a very emotional feeling to meet former students and talk about the past and present. I do miss a number of the staff who I was close to and who are now deceased.

One of my goals after retirement was to backpack the Pacific Crest Trail. It is a 2,700 mile trail that starts at the Mexican border in California and follows the crest of



the mountains through California, Oregon, and the state of Washington into Canada. It took me three summers to complete. After hiking, I decided to bike down the east coast (Highways 101 and 1). I started in Seattle and ended up at the Mexican border. I never owned a bike until I was age 66. I enjoy the physical activity involved, the adventure, and most of all the scenery. This summer I plan to bike from San Diego to Florida, up the East Coast to Virginia, over to Kentucky, and home. I'm never short of goals and adventure. I work out on a regular basis at the Hall of Fame Fitness Center and work part time at several jobs.



Five more outstanding alumni were honored on May 15, 1998, with our Association's highest award. These individuals were feted at a banquet held in their honor. The honorees chose someone who made introductory remarks about them, and then each inductee gave a short acceptance speech. This article summarizes the remarks made at that dinner.



Lou "Sticky" Glew '46 was pleased to introduce Robert Boni '46. Bob attended Lincoln for six years-starting in the 7th grade. Lou told stories of how entertained school friends by playing "boogie woogie" piano during his years at Lincoln. After Lincoln, Bob graduated with a degree in Metallurgical Engineering from the University of Cincinnati,

earned an MS and Ph.D. from Carnegie Institute of Technology in 1954, and attended Harvard University, MIT, and Cornell University Management Programs. He served in the U.S. Army from 1954-56. During his business career, Bob was vice president, president and chief operating officer, and chairman and chief executive officer of Armco Inc. Later he became director of Chitogenics Inc. Bob served as trustee and director on many foundation and corporation boards and received many honors during his career.

Bob thanked Lou, the committee, and the association for this honor. He commented that success depends on a lot of good fortune -- a lot of luck. And he said he has had a lot of luck in his life beginning with his mother who helped him develop a sense of self worth. He said he also had the good fortune of having had excellent teachers. One of those he named was Mr. Bigler who taught biology, chemistry, and physics at Lincoln. Mr. Bigler instilled in him a love of science that he has never gotten over and also the confidence that there are no problems that need go unsolved. He was fortunate to have met and married his best friend in college, Janet, and to have raised two wonderful daughters. He was fortunate to have had excellent mentors and then excellent people who followed him. He had the good fortune to be confronted with very serious and exciting challenges. He said it was the solutions to those challenges which lead to whatever success our association was honoring him for at this event. He humbly dedicated his honor to all the good luck he has had in his life. Nicci Huston DiMarzio '46 read the inscription and presented Bob with a lovely clock plaque.

Robin Austin '71 said he was flattered and honored to be presenter for Janet Weir Creighton '68. He said she could have asked Mike DeWine, George Voinovich, or Bob Taft, and they would have made every effort to come because they

respect her that much. He said Janet is a great example of the very best that Lincoln High School had to offer. Janet was Stark County Recorder from 1985-1991 and has been Stark County Auditor since 1991. She has served on many professional and political committees, including the County Auditors' Association of Ohio and Stark County Elected Officials. Janet has been



an active community volunteer, and she has been and continues to be very active with the Pro Football HOF. Janet was a founding member of CLHSAA and served as president. He said Janet is proud of her other important titles, those of Mrs. Bill Turnbow, mother of Jennifer and John, and grandmother of Benjamin. Robin said he was proud to be a member of an organization that had the wisdom and good sense to honor someone who has contributed so much to our Alumni Association as well as to our community.

Janet thanked Robin and congratulated the other honorees. She said she felt humbled to be part of this group. Janet introduced the individuals sitting at her table and thanked the committee, the Association, and the Class of 1968. Janet then donated a scholarship in honor of the Class of 1968.

Janet stressed that, although her career and family keep her very busy, she still finds the energy to get involved with the community. She said her community activities are actually labors of love and joy for her. Janet said pride in the community was instilled by her family as well as her teachers. She indicated how much she appreciated the bestowing of this award on her. Fellow classmate, **Sue Berg Self**, presented Janet's plaque.

In presenting John Dickerson '60, former teammate, Jim "Ozzie" Osborn '59, said he was honored to be introducing John because they have been friends since 1957 when they played a lot of basketball together. Jim reminisced about the year John played the entire season with a cast on his arm. John graduated from Mount Union College in 1964, earned his MA in School Administration in 1969 at the University of Akron, and has done post graduate work. He spent 31



years in education--15 as an administrator and 16 the classroom. including several years at Lincoln. He coached basketball for 19 years. When John retired from education in 1995, he became Assistant Commissioner of the School Ohio High Athletic Association in Columbus. Through his work in education and athletics, he has received many awards. John and

his wife are the parents of a son and a daughter.

When John stepped up to the podium, he said he feels privileged that Jim was his presenter, and he offered his congratulations to the other recipients. He said he feels blessed to have had the opportunity to work with young people as teacher, principal, coach, and administrator; and he hopes he has had some type of a positive influence on a few young people along the way. He said the greatest reward one can get is when a student you have worked with comes back and thanks you.

John thinks the teachers at Lincoln were the best. He feels fortunate to be involved in athletics, and he remembers all of his great teammates at Lincoln, including the 1959 "team of midgets" composed of George Saimes, Jerry Lyke, Jim Osborn, Fritz Massouh, John Andreadis and, of course, John Dickerson--the "midget of all." He also remembers Coach Ken Newlon fondly.

John said he was honored and humbled to be included with the other recipients and feels that what little he has done in the field of education all started out at Lincoln High School. He thanked the Alumni Association for all that they do. John's 1960 classmate, **Karen Gerzina Samuelson**, presented his plaque and read the inscription.

Carolyn Blackledge Husted '50 first met Phyllis Elsass '50 as a freshman, but they became really good friends when



they were both in A Cappella choir. Carolyn said it was a pleasure to present Phyllis as a distinguished alumnus. Phyllis graduated from Aultman Hospital School of Nursing in 1953, was commissioned Ensign in the U.S. Navy in 1956, and earned a BS in Nursing in 1965 and an MSN in 1966 at the University of Colorado. Her Naval career took her to many locales, both in

the U.S. and in foreign countries. She achieved the rank of Captain in 1976 and became Director of Nursing Service, Naval Hospital, Bethesda in 1981. In 1983, she was confirmed as Commanding Officer of the Naval School of Health Sciences, the first woman and first nurse appointed to that command. She retired in 1987. During her career she received many awards, including the Navy Commendation Medal and Navy Legion of Merit. She remains active in the Navy Nurse Corps Ass'n. Carolyn said that she and her family were honored to attend Phyllis' retirement ceremony.

Phyllis was thrilled to be able to share the evening with so many classmates and family, and she thanked the association for this opportunity. While thinking about her years at Lincoln, she remembered among other things dissecting frogs, singing in the choir, working on the *Echo*, and being a member of Alexis League which had **Helen Gatchel** as an advisor. Helen became her lifelong friend and mentor. But what she cherishes most about school and career is not where she was, but who she was there with. Her teachers, mentors, associates, and friends have had the most impact on her life.

Phyllis said it was her military career that we were honoring at this event, but she said her career just happened because she benefited from both the feminist movement and the restructuring of the Naval Medical Corps. She said she fell into each opportunity as it came along. Another good friend, Elizabeth Schrock Bell '50, awarded her plaque.



Presenter Gary Love '55 said that in his lifetime, he has had three School High Lincoln heroes--his brother, Bob Love '49, Mike Regina '44, and Toby Zettler '55. That is why he was so honored to present Toby to us. He said Toby worked part time and played sports but always maintained a high grade point average. However, Gary did recall one time when Toby lost his focus,

the day Toby, driving his father's DeSoto, rear ended Gary, who was driving his father's DeSoto! After graduation from Lincoln, Toby married his high school sweetheart, Eleanor "Nora" Yokes '55. They have five children and eight grandchildren. ### LIVING IN THE BIG EASY

I have lived in New Orleans with my husband, Jack Arnold, and two daughters for the past eighteen years. While we still think of ourselves as Ohioans, our children think of themselves as natives of New Orleans. For the past seven years, I have practiced law in one of the oldest law firms in New Orleans. The Milling Benson law firm is over 100 years old.

Remember that saying about some places being a "great place to visit but not to live there?" Living in New Orleans is like visiting a great place and living there. While the neighborhoods, except the French Quarter and the Garden District, are pretty much like living anywhere else in the United States, the accessibility of the French Quarter and the Garden District, not to mention cultural events, terrific food, and exciting music, make life in New Orleans very different.

The downside of living in New Orleans is crime and schools. Crime here is like crime in any metropolitan area. The school systems leave something to be desired. There are three separate school systems: the oldest, parochial (Catholic); private; and public. In Louisiana, public schools get the short end of the stick.

The two most fascinating places to visit in New Orleans are the French Quarter and the Garden District. The French Quarter offers a tremendous variety of foods, smells, sights, sounds, and shopping. There are certain "must do" things for any tourist who comes to New Orleans. One of them is eating beignets at the Cafe du Monde. Beignets are square, holeless, fried doughnuts covered with half a box of powdered sugar which are irresistible with hot chocolate or chicory coffee. The Cafe du Monde is open 364 days a year for 24 hours a day, closing only on Christmas Day. Most tables are outside under a canopy.

Good food in New Orleans isn't confined to the ritzy places; some restaurants are seemingly run-down but offer some of the best food in New Orleans. My advice to anyone thinking of coming to New Orleans is come prepared with a good tour book to help you choose a restaurant. There are so many good ones to choose from.

The French Quarter also offers a large number of unusual gift and specialty shops, historical museums, street entertainers who perform for donations, and great music. A great way to get a feel for the Quarter is to take a ride on a horse drawn carriage. The drivers are excellent and witty tour guides. Finally, any kind of music you'd like to hear--whether it be jazz, country, rock and roll, or alternative--can be found in the Quarter--usually in the same block. A ride on a paddleboat on the Mississippi River is also a not-to-be-missed experience.

Part of St. Charles Avenue is the heart of the Garden District. The cheapest and most enjoyable way to see the stately, colorful, antebellum homes along St. Charles is to ride a streetcar. One boards a streetcar on the side of Canal Street known as the CBD, or Central Business District, which is across Canal from the Quarter. When the streetcar comes to the end of the line on Carrolton Avenue, everyone must disembark and pay to ride back to the CBD.

Special events in New Orleans are many. One of the most popular is the Jazz and Heritage Festival which lasts two weekends--the last in April and the first one in May. There are many regular cultural events in New Orleans as well. Of course, everyone knows about Mardi Gras or Fat Tuesday. But what is not generally known is that Carnival season is more than just three back-to-back parades on the day before Ash Wednesday. Carnival involves parades on weekends and some weeknights for two weeks before Mardi Gras. The parades on St. Patrick's Day, Easter, St. Joseph's Day, and Halloween are much the same as those on Mardi Gras but are much smaller. (New Orleanians will throw a party or have a parade for any occasion, or no occasion, hence the name the "Big Easy.")

New Orleans is a curious mix of rich and dirt-poor people and of casual attitudes and dress and formal dress, pomp, and traditions. There is a reverence for old things and a reluctance to change. New Orleans associates itself more with Europe than America. For instance, we celebrate Bastille Day in July with fireworks.

If you come to New Orleans, call and say hello. []




