The scholarship program of the Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association experienced an exceptional year in 1999 as forty-two \$500 scholarships were awarded for a total of \$21,000. Never before have so many scholarships been granted in one year. This brings the ten-year total to \$134,300.

Of the forty-two recipients, two scholarships were awarded in memory of Carlton N. Gowdy, a teacher at Lincoln; and one scholarship was awarded in memory of Ed Mang, Class of 1951. In addition, the Classes of 1963, 1968, and 1969 each sponsored a scholarship to a descendant of a classmate. Thirty-one recipients had recently graduated from high school, and eleven were already attending college. These outstanding people represent their families, their schools, and Lincoln High School well. Furthermore, they have lofty aspirations which, because of their motivation, will no doubt be attained. We congratulate them and wish them well in their future academic pursuits.

To honor the recipients and their families, a reception was held at the Mayfield Senior Center on July 20, 1999. Thanks to **Faye Moore Staugh '52** and her committee for preparing the refreshments, especially the delicious desserts.

Applicants who did not receive a scholarship in 1999 are reminded that they may re-apply. Graduates and attendees of Lincoln High School and Lincoln Junior High School, as well as their linear descendants, are eligible for scholarships.



CLHSAA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The purpose of the Scholarship Committee is to award non-repayable grants to deserving students who are either graduates, attendees, or descendents of Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School. Descendents include child(ren), grandchild(ren), great-grandchild(ren), stepchild(ren), adopted child(ren), or spouse of attendees or graduates who are paid members of CLHSAA for the current calendar year. If the applicant's only lineal Lincoln ancestor is deceased, then the paid membership requirement is waived.

The Scholarship Committee will consider all applicants for grants regardless of race, color, creed, religion, sex, or national origin. All information supplied by applicants is strictly confidential with exception of names, addresses, telephone numbers, and names of ancestors who attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School.

CLHSAA reserves the right to determine the amount and number of grants to be presented in any year. Scholarships are awarded to students who are pursuing ANY type of post high school education at any type of accredited school, i.e. college, junior college, technical, or trade schools. Checks are made payable to each student's school. An Awards Reception where presentations are announced and recipients honored is held in July.

The 2000 scholarship application forms were mailed in January along with membership renewal forms. The deadline for 2000 applications was March 15, 2000.

Students interested in applying for a 2001 CLHSAA grant should watch for a scholarship application form which will be included with 2001 membership renewal forms to be mailed in January 2001.

Up until a year ago, it seemed like an insurmountable task! Replacing nearly 300 windows in the old Lincoln High School building! However, weather and time had taken their cruel toll. Clearly, something had to be done to refurbish the beautiful, historic building; and the current owners, Heritage Christian School, made the commitment to do it. A generous donation by a concerned individual got this ambitious preservation project off the ground by providing the means to replace windows on one side. The remaining three sides were divided into subcategories: current Heritage families, staff and alumni; concerned business and community members; and Lincoln alumni. We are extremely happy to report that three sides of the building are now complete.

In fact, THERE ARE ONLY 30 WINDOWS STILL AVAILABLE!

The final stage consists of the side facing Sixth Street, the front of the building still proudly bearing the name, Lincoln High School. It occurred to project committee members that this would be the side Lincoln alumni would like to preserve as their own. Classes are invited to pull together and purchase windows in tribute of their Lincoln days. As our way of saying thank you, a commemorative plaque listing donor classes will be prominently displayed in the lobby area, forever etching the year of your graduating class on the walls of those familiar hallways. In addition, a donor book will list the names of all those contributing to this worthwhile project. Each class will need to raise \$1,000 per window. It's surprisingly easy to do! The class of '44 simply sent out a letter to class members and,

by combining checks both large and small, has already purchased a class window! The class of '46 was hoping to be able to do the same. A letter went out. Checks came in: some for \$5, some for hundreds. And when it was all counted, they had purchased FOUR windows--enough to complete an *entire* room! A special plaque will be displayed in rooms honoring the class of '46 and any other classes who are able to do the same

Any Lincoln alumni who live in or are visiting the Canton area are invited to come on over and see this remarkable transformation for yourselves! For the full effect, drive by Sixth Street for the "before" and then turn up Harrison for the "after!" What a difference!

Don't let your class be left out! If you are planning a reunion soon, you are already in touch with class members. Or, what a fun excuse to call a couple of old high school friends. "Hey! Let's go together and buy a class window!" Windows can also be purchased in honor or memory of a person who has made a significant difference in your life! However, there is a very small "window of opportunity" left! As we said, there are only 30 windows remaining, RESERVED ESPECIALLY FOR LINCOLN ALUMNI.



OUR TEACHER . . . Richard Bamberger

Imagine graduating from Canton Lincoln High School and then returning several years later to be part of a faculty that included many of your former teachers. That's exactly what happened to **Richard Bamberger**, a member of the **Class of 1943** who taught biology, science, and health at Lincoln from 1950 to 1960. He remembers entering his first faculty meeting as a teacher, looking around, and thinking, "You've got to be kidding." Subsequently, though, he found his coworkers all eager to do anything they could to help him. He was the first Lincoln grad to go back there to teach, but later quite a few others followed his lead.



Class The of 1943 was the very first class graduate from Lincoln, which had been a junior high school before that. Bamberger was a member of that class's football team, playing center on offense guard and on defense. He reminisced about wearing hand-medown black and red McKinley uniforms during his team's freshman and years sophomore and having

Lincoln's original blue and gold colors taken away by Timken when they became a senior high school before Lincoln did. Junie Ferrall was the football coach, and in 1942 the Lincoln team was declared city champs after tying McKinley.

One of Mr. Bamberger's most vivid memories of his student days at Lincoln is the time he got kicked out of school for the day. A group of football players took offense at the idea of a girl wearing slacks to school (shocking in 1943!) and decided that they would wear skirts to class. Mr. Carl Meyer, the principal, was not amused. Mr. Bamberger also fondly remembers hour and a half lunch periods at Lincoln, which he and his friends spent hanging out at Charlie's Inn on West Tusc. eating three hamburgers and a milkshake for twenty-five cents!

About his ten-year teaching stint at Lincoln, Mr. Bamberger said, "They were the best years of my 33 years of teaching. Kids in those days had respect and parents had control. When

we had open house, there were long lines of parents waiting to see their kids' teachers. They showed tremendous interest. The worst thing kids might do in those days was smoke. A kid smoking was considered pretty shocking. When I go by the school now, it brings back so many memories, both as a student and a teacher. I hated to see them close Lincoln down."

During all of his teaching years at Lincoln, Mr. Bamberger was also a coach of football, basketball, intramurals, and golf. The Lincoln golf team won the city championship while he was the coach, and the reserve football team had an undefeated and untied season under his tutelage. He gave up coaching in 1960 so he could be in attendance when one of his four sons played football for Glenwood High. Later, another son played at Glenoak. Today, Mr. Bamberger has two sons in Stark County, one in California and one in Pennsylvania. There are six grandchildren. He and his wife, whom he met at Kent State University, will celebrate 52 years of marriage this April.

In 1960 Mr. Bamberger was transferred to McKinley High School, where he taught for ten years, and then he finished his career in Canton City Schools Administration, at one time teaching physical education on TV to Canton City elementary students. He has been retired since June 1983 and keeps trim and active by playing lots of golf and doing plenty of walking.

"I don't envy teachers today at all," said Mr. Bamberger. "I wouldn't teach today because of students' attitudes and government mandates. I think the quality of education was better when I attended and taught at Canton Lincoln because there were fewer distractions. I'd say the majority of kids worked real hard back then." Obviously, Mr. Bamberger did too and can now reflect on those years with satisfaction. []

After graduating in **1975**, Mark attended Ohio State University where he graduated in 1979. From 1992 to present, Mark has worked as Instrument Music Director for Grades 6-12 at Kenston Local Schools. The Kenston marching bands have performed at Disney World and the Kentucky Derby Parade.

As you can see, Mark is a very busy professional; but, in May of 1992 when he was contacted by Joe Garber as a possible director of the newly formed Lincoln High School Alumni Band, he readily agreed. (Mark's relationship with us began during the years of 1971-1973 when Joe served as president of the Lincoln Band Parents.) Members of the alumni band range from the Class of '43 through the Class of '76. "Echo Staff" to Meet with Advisor

Call it a sentimental journey if you like, but if the "old *Echo* advisor" has her way, a handful or more of former *Echo* staff members and Lincoln High journalism students will meet on the weekend of September 15-17 -- the same weekend as the proposed **Class of 1955** reunion. The advisor and former Lincoln faculty member, **Nanette DeMuesy**, has long cherished the young students who produced the *Lincoln Echo* in the early 50's when she was there.
