The year 2001 was another exceptional one for the Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association, as forty-four \$500 scholarships were awarded. This record-setting amount brought the grand total given out during the last twelve years to \$175,800. This accomplishment, combined with the outstanding credentials of the scholarship recipients, truly keeps the "Spirit of Lincoln" alive.

At the annual meeting in September 2001, the slate of candidates for 2002 was presented by Nominating Chairman, Gary Love. The CLHSAA Scholarship Fund has received some charitable donations, but the one area that has not yet yielded funds is the last will and testament of a Lincoln alumnus. If you are thinking of making a revision of your will, you may wish to remember the CLHSAA Scholarship Fund. Of course, a donation made during your lifetime is always welcome—and preferred!

CLHSAA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The purpose of the Scholarship Committee is to award non-repayable grants to deserving students who are either graduates or attendees of Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School or their descendants. Descendants include child(ren), grandchild(ren), great-grandchild(ren), step-child(ren), adopted child(ren), or spouse of attendees or graduates who are <u>paid members</u> of CLHSAA for the <u>current</u> calendar year. If the applicant's **only** lineal Lincoln ancestor is deceased, then the paid membership requirement is waived.

The Scholarship Committee will consider all applicants for grants regardless of race, color, creed, religion, sex, or national origin. All information supplied by applicants is strictly confidential with exception of names, addresses, telephone numbers, and names of ancestors who attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School.

CLHSAA reserves the right to determine the amount and number of grants to be presented in any year. Scholarships are awarded to students who are pursuing **ANY** type of post high school education at any type of accredited school; i.e., college, junior college, technical, or trade schools. Checks are made payable to each student's <u>school</u>. An Awards Reception where presentations are announced and recipients honored is planned for July.

Applicants may apply every year; however, scholarship <u>recipients</u> are <u>eligible only every third year</u>, with a <u>lifetime maximum of two</u> CLHSAA scholarships. Students interested in applying for a 2003 CLHSAA grant should watch for a scholarship application form which will be included with 2003 membership renewal forms to be mailed in January 2003.

The 2002 scholarship application forms were mailed in January along with membership renewal forms. The deadline for 2002 applications was March 15, 2002.

C. Maurice Oatley Life's Vocation Found

My first day as a teacher at Lincoln High School was the fulfillment of a search for self-actualization.

I wasn't like most of the other people in my class. They seemed to know exactly what they wanted to do in life, or at least they had a good idea of what they wanted to be. Personally, I had no idea what the future held for me. There was another person in my class who felt the same way.

I'll never forget my high school graduation day--the feeling of exhilaration. The next day I went sailing on Winona Lake with my friend Charlie, who had a sailboat. We were opposites, socio-economically, but alike in our uncertainty about the future. We decided to wait one year before taking a course of action. So, I continued working at the grocery, and he went to work in his family's foundry. One year later we both enrolled in college.

It was the realization, early on, that many students were like me that helped me so much as an educator. The students who knew what they wanted to do were easy to help; all they needed was encouragement. It was the students who were uncertain about the future that wanted and needed my help. I tried to help them believe in themselves and in what they could do and accept the idea that their future would eventually be revealed to them if they would just continue to do their best in school.

My mother taught me that I could do what I believed was possible. I tried to inculcate this same idea in my students. The concept of a person's own cognitive ability-the belief that what we can conceive we can achieve-is very real. Helping students to understand and believe that truth is the beginning of an open-ended, productive life

My thirty-two years in education were a rich and wonderful experience for me, but the best years of my life were spent at Lincoln High School from 1964 to 1970. []

Louis D. Ryman Musings on Life

In 1948, I graduated from Wittenberg University and was hired by the Canton Board of Education. Initially, I taught physical education in the elementary schools and coached at Lincoln High School, assisting **John Fife** in football and **Chuck Forrest** in basketball. After two years, I became a coach at Lehman High School and continued teaching gym classes in the lower grades.

I must say my two years at Lincoln were very gratifying and a fine way to begin my 33-year teaching career.

At Lehman, I taught art for 21 years and filled the remaining years with teaching health while coaching on the side before retiring in 1981. However, even before I retired from teaching in the Canton City School System, I was teaching private art lessons at my home for adults, and I still do. My next session will start this April and go through August. Class time is from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m., once a week and classes are small (5 or 6). I stress the fundamentals, and the subject areas are usually portraiture, landscape, or still-life. For watercolor, we use the small sets. All my classes are free.

After retirement I did some art teaching as a substitute in the county high schools, spent one year in the real estate business, and was a volunteer at Start County Hospice for four years.

A defining moment in my many years came in 1964. While watching the Bishop Fulton J. Sheen weekly television show--Life Is Worth Living--an idea crossed my mind. Ten years later, the idea became a novel. In brief, the setting is Chicago in 2027 when American democratic rule has broken down and our nation is in the midst of a revolt. It is a grim picture of our future but ends on an optimistic note. The title is The Portrait. The book is being published by a subsidy company (Dorrance) in Pittsburgh, the production department is underway, and the promotion department is making contact with local and national distributors, wholesalers, book reviewers, and media contacts with personalized letters and flyers. I think it will be a "fun ride" to see what happens.

My deepest regret is that three of my loved ones won't be here to share with me the thrill of publication. My wife, Donna, died in 1992; my daughter, Linda Fry, failed to recover from openheart surgery in January 2001; and my twin sister, Lanta Richards, died of cancer last April. I've dedicated my book to the memory of Linda. My best wishes to all and God bless. []

Passed away August 17, 1964

From Repository Obituary -- in part:

Miss Olga Lenz, 64, who retired as a Spanish teacher from Lincoln High School in 1962, died Sunday, August 17, 1964, after a fall in her home.

Letter to the Editor (August 21, 1964) from Nan DeMuesy:

This note of appreciation should in all fairness remain unsigned, for a single signature indicates a single opinion and that just isn't so . . . not when you realize that several hundred fellow teachers and at least a thousand former students would consider it their privilege to sign this note.

As so many reflect today on the life and goodness of the late Olga Lenz, there is little doubt but that she ranks with the cherished few.

Here was one of Canton's finest teachers -- a perfectionist without pressure, a challenger with the graciousness of charity.

All of us are experiencing difficulty in accepting her sudden departure, but the value of her life grows even lovelier in memory . . . and this is our priceless heritage.

FAWCETT STADIUM TOWER LOGO PROJECT

The Canton City School District graciously acknowledged Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association's contribution to the Fawcett Stadium Tower Project. The four-tower project was part of the original stadium plan when the stadium was first designed, but the project was never completed.

In a letter last summer from the Director of Physical Activities/Facilities for the Canton City Schools, Tom Brabson, the four city high school alumni associations were asked to make a one-time donation of \$2,000 each toward the tower project. The towers are to be cared for by the system's maintenance crew. Lincoln High School and the three other city high schools are saluted with a professionally created logo of the school's mascot at each tower facing the inside of the stadium. On top of each tower, there is a 20-foot flagpole. A banner with the school's name will fly over its respective logo.

The Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association Board wholeheartedly supported this exciting project; but, since our monies are predominantly raised for scholarships, it was necessary to seek funding elsewhere. Upon hearing of the need, several committees and individuals donated generously; and our financial commitment to the project is almost complete. If you would like to make a donation toward this ever-present reminder of our great school and of the exciting games played in Fawcett Stadium, please send your contribution to CLHSAA, PO Box 20192, Canton, OH 44701 with a notation that it is for the "Fawcett Stadium Project." (CLHSAA has 501c3 IRS status; therefore, all donations are tax deductible.) With help and conviction, the alumni association will continue to "keep the Spirit of Lincoln alive!"

The history of Canton City Schools sports has also been emphasized through murals and memorabilia prominently displayed in the entrance and halls of Memorial Fieldhouse. The feeling was that these historical remembrances would tie the community to the facility and reflect its glorious past. A new sign displaying all four school logos has also been added inside Memorial Fieldhouse.

It is hoped that the student-athlete of today will be inspired by the schools and teams of the past and will strive to meet or surpass the achievements of those who are so proudly honored by this project. The era of the four high schools in Canton was truly a special time in our city's history. Unfortunately, neighborhood schools at the secondary level are a thing of the past in Canton, but that era lives on in the memories of those of us fortunate enough to have lived and learned then -- and by the above-mentioned project. []
