Another Record-Setting Year

A dessert reception was held at Westminster Presbyterian Church on July 15, 2003 to honor the recipients of the Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association Scholarships. A total of **fifty-three \$500 scholarships** was awarded. Since the scholarship program was started in 1990, a total of **\$224,800** has been given to **451** graduates or descendants of Lincoln students. The Alumni Association can be very proud of this wonderful accomplishment.

Of the 53 recipients, ten received special scholarships. For the fifth consecutive year, the Ed Mang, Class of 51, Memorial Scholarship was awarded. A memorial scholarship was also presented in memory of Susie Biasella, a friend of Lincoln. Nanette DeMuesy, a Lincoln teacher, donated a scholarship in honor of the LHS *Echo* Staffs of '54 and '55. Also, an anonymous donor provided a scholarship in Honor of Nanette DeMuesy. The Class of 1949 and the Class of 1962 each sponsored a scholarship in honor of their respective classes. Dick '44 and Carol Van Lew donated two scholarships, and the American Legion Post #44 also funded two scholarships.

Thirty-six of the 2003 scholarship winners were recent high school graduates, and seventeen were current college students, including Lincoln graduates J. Mark Lowe '75, Patricia Schario Milford '68, and Jack Tisevich '73. We congratulate all of our recipients and wish them well with their future academic goals.

Applicants who did not receive a scholarship in 2003 are reminded that they may reapply. Graduates and attendees of Lincoln High School and Lincoln Junior High School, as well as their lineal descendants, are eligible for scholarships.

The members of the 2003 Scholarship Committee were Roger Hegnauer '71, chairman; Karen Mottice Christoff '72; Don Dorkoff '59; Paula Lightbody '71; and Sherry Schario Cini-Putnam '60. Learning to Drive at Lincoln High Glenn Himebaugh '54 Murfreesboro, Tenn.

Just about everyone has a favorite teacher--someone they look back on and say, he or she made a difference in my life. For me, that person is **Nan DeMuesy**, who taught me the craft and rewards of journalism when she advised the *Lincoln Echo* and I was privileged to be a staff writer in 1953-54.

Now, after stints on the *Canton Repository*, *Athens Messenger* and the defunct *Indianapolis News*, and 37 years of teaching journalism, first at Kent State Stark and then at Middle Tennessee State University, I want to thank Nan for all she did for me and so many other Lincoln High students.

I'd like to use the skills she taught to tell you about another interesting teacher I remember from my days at Lincoln. **Charles Lux** taught driver education, and some of my more harrowing experiences were in that car as we jolted around town.

As I recall, one of us drove, Mr. Lux sat in the front passenger seat, and two fellow wannabe drivers occupied the back seat awaiting their turns behind the wheel. Mr. Lux had sandy red hair and a habit of humming. The more nervous he became the louder he hummed.

The day I pulled to a stop at the light on Sixth Street in front of Lincoln High School and casually lifted the steering wheel off its post and handed it to him, he hummed more than I'd ever heard before or after.

On another memorable occasion, the poor man got so frustrated that humming gave way to shouting. I was in the back seat that day as a young lady, who shall forever remain nameless, sat behind the wheel. Sat is, indeed, the operative word here. We were in an alley next to the old Stark department store that faced East Tuscarawas Street just down the hill from the square in Canton.

Traffic flowed past on Tusc as we waited our chance to pull onto the main street, but there were plenty of opportunities to make the move. Still, we sat. And sat. And sat some more. Our driver was seemingly frightened to death.

After what seemed like five minutes, but probably was half that, Mr. Lux turned to the petrified student driver and roared. "Doggone it, if you sit here long enough something is bound to come!"

I've often wondered what happened to that young lady in later years. I'd like to think she turned out to be a fine driver--one that would have made Mr. Lux proud.

CLHSAA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The purpose of the Scholarship Committee is to award non-repayable grants to deserving students who are either graduates or attendees of Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School or their descendants. Descendants include child(ren), grandchild(ren), great-grandchild(ren), step-child(ren), adopted child(ren), or spouse of attendees or graduates who are <u>paid members</u> of CLHSAA for the <u>current</u> calendar year. If the applicant's **only** lineal Lincoln ancestor is deceased, then the paid membership requirement is waived.

The Scholarship Committee will consider all applicants for grants regardless of race, color, creed, religion, sex, or national origin. All information supplied by applicants is strictly confidential with exception of names, addresses, telephone numbers, and names of ancestors who attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School.

CLHSAA reserves the right to determine the amount and number of grants to be presented in any year. Scholarships are awarded to students who are pursuing **ANY** type of post high school education at any type of accredited school; i.e., college, junior college, technical, or trade schools. Checks are made payable to each student's <u>school</u>. An Awards Reception where presentations are announced and recipients honored is planned for July.

Applicants may apply every year; however, scholarship recipients are eligible only every third year, with a lifetime maximum of two CLHSAA scholarships. Students interested in applying for a 2005 CLHSAA grant should watch for a scholarship application form which will be included with 2005 membership renewal forms to be mailed in January 2005.

The 2004 scholarship application forms were mailed in January along with membership renewal forms. The deadline for 2004 applications was March 15, 2004.



Our Teacher -- Mr. Ken Rook

Dave Schemansky '66

During your scholastic career, having a meeting with one of your teachers was generally not looked upon as a "fun" event. Such was not the case recently as **Paula Lightbody '71** and I had the opportunity to sit down with one of our former teachers, Ken Rook. This was our turn to make the teacher sweat. Hard as we tried, nary a bead broke out on his brow.

Ken Rook is a native of Stark County and is a graduate of Jackson High School. After high school graduation, he took a job driving fuel tanker with a local oil company. The Korean War interrupted this endeavor. Four years later, he exited the military only to be faced with a momentous decision--go back to driving truck or take advantage of the GI bill. He said that it was an easy decision to make.

Being one of seven children raised by a widowed mother, a college education was not in the cards for Ken. An excellent student in high school, a college education was beyond the means of his mother and family at that time. The GI bill changed all of that.

Following his undergraduate days at Akron University, where he majored in science and math, Ken did his student teaching at McKinley High School. He was persuaded by the administration at McKinley to continue there as a science teacher for another year before transferring to Lincoln.

In 1961, Ken Rook arrived at Lincoln. His first assignment there was to teach physics. Over the next 15 years, till the closing of Lincoln in 1976, Mr. Rook taught geometry, physics, senior science, coached in the Army-Navy basketball tussle (his first, the '63 squad won) and mentored the chess club. By the late 60's, he had completed his master's studies at Kent State and gravitated to guidance counseling.

During our luncheon interview, it was clear to Paula and me that he had a passion for teaching and helping students. He stated that he was always cognizant that one sentence or phrase uttered by a teacher could stay with a student forever. He stressed this point as he told us a story about attending the 40th reunion of the Class of 1963 last summer. There he met one of his former physics students. This '63 grad told Mr. Rook how an admonishment made to him--to buckle down and apply himself or he would never succeed--had driven him to a successful collegiate and business career.

When I was a student in Mr. Rook's physics class in '65-'66, I don't remember the humorous side of him that Paula did as a geometry student in '68-'69. What impressed me about him was that I saw him as always having the gears engaged, so to speak. He was always thinking. Paula related the story about how he had marched his sophomore geometry class down the hall, into a senior classroom, marched them around the room which was filled with seniors, and then returned them to their own classroom. He never said a word to anyone, including the other teacher. Almost sounds like something **Mr. Jed (Thomas Jednaszewski)** would do.

After Paula relived a few other humorous instances about his geometry class, Ken gave us a couple of his own

remembrances and observations about Lincoln. As a teacher at Lincoln, he often teased or jousted verbally with Arabella Hopkins. (Talk about courage!) That may have been because they were both math majors and precision was a way of life for each. He happened one day to be on Arabella's floor when the bell rang for the beginning of class. He was there to fetch **Bill** Murphy '67 from a class which was across the hall from Arabella's classroom. When she grilled Ken as to what he was doing there, he replied that he was waiting on Bill to exit the class for a meeting with him. Arabella quickly corrected him by saying, "You are waiting <u>for</u> him, not <u>on</u> him." (So, you see, it was all males, no matter the size or the age, who Miss Hopkins gunned down.)

When Lincoln closed in 1976, Ken went to Timken as a guidance counselor. By this time, the paperwork requirements of being a guidance counselor had seriously depleted his zeal. Helping students was being overcome by these requirements. To get back to what he loved, working with students, he transferred to McKinley and returned to the classroom. In 1989, he retired from teaching.

I asked Ken what his thoughts were regarding the consolidation of the schools which closed Lincoln. He replied by stating how ironic it is now that McKinley and Timken are being cleaved into "smaller" modules. Although he did not verbalize it, his body language told us that he had not been a fan of the consolidation.

Since retirement, Ken and his wife have remained in the area, and seven years ago they built a new home in the Perry school district. During his career at Lincoln, they lived near 12th and Broad N.W. Many of you probably remember seeing him leave the building either on foot or riding his bicycle at day's end. He still frequently rides a bicycle.

The parents of a daughter and two sons, the Rooks are the proud grandparents of a granddaughter and a grandson. While helping care for their grandkids and working on the "honey do list," Ken also finds time to work for a local nursery. The Rooks are enjoying their family and their retirement.

Finally, I want to pass on a little tidbit to a group from the '1963 class. It seems that, with the birth of their son in '63, the Rooks were presented with a baby gift from a group of students his (Nina Nikishin, Elsie Anderson, and Marti Murray). The son, who now owns a small business in Connecticut, still has the toy given to his parents by the students from his father's class.


