What a fabulous milestone this was. As we are all aware, Lincoln was closed in 1976, but this alumni association continues to honor those who were lucky enough to have attended one of the finest schools anywhere. (Not too proud!) Every Lincoln Lion who has ever participated in any way with the alumni association should be so proud of this wonderful fete, and the way the spirit of Lincoln High School is being kept alive thirty years after the doors were shut.

A dessert reception was held at Westminster Presbyterian Church on July 19, 2005 to honor the recipients of the Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association Scholarships. A total of forty-eight \$500 scholarships was awarded. Since the scholarship program began in 1990, a total of \$273,300 has been awarded to 548 graduates or descendants of Lincoln students.

Of the 48 recipients in 2005, three received special scholarships. For the seventh consecutive year, the **Ed Mang, Class of 1951, Memorial Scholarship** was awarded. The Class of 1974 donated a scholarship **In Honor of the LHS Class of 1974**, and **Karen Mottice Christoff '72** provided a scholarship **In Memory of Christine Santilli Barstow, Class of 1972**.

Thirty-one of the 2005 scholarship recipients were recent high school graduates, and seventeen were current college students. We congratulate all of our recipients and wish them well in their future academic pursuits.

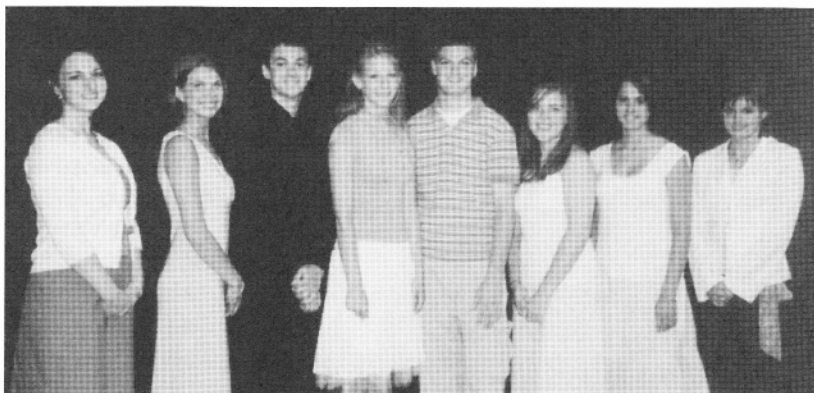

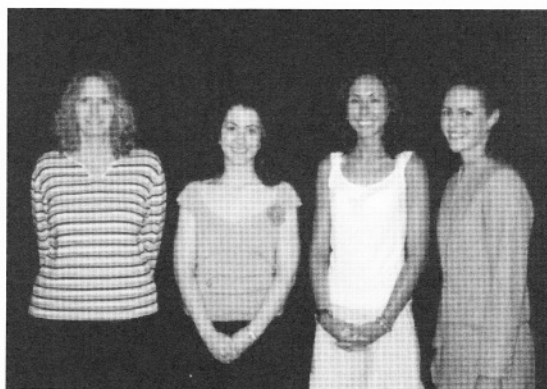

CLHSAA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The purpose of the Scholarship Committee is to award non-repayable grants to deserving students who are either graduates or attendees of Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School or their descendants. Descendants include child(ren), grandchild(ren), great-grandchild(ren), step-child(ren), adopted child(ren), or spouse of attendees or graduates who are paid members of CLHSAA for the current calendar year. If the applicant's only lineal Lincoln ancestor is deceased, then the paid membership requirement is waived.

The Scholarship Committee will consider all applicants for grants regardless of race, color, creed, religion, sex, or national origin. All information supplied by applicants is strictly confidential with exception of names, addresses, telephone numbers, and names of ancestors who attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School.

CLHSAA reserves the right to determine the amount and number of grants to be presented in any year. Scholarships are awarded to students who are pursuing **ANY** type of post high school education at any type of accredited school; i.e., college, junior college, technical, or trade schools. Checks are made payable to each student's school. An Awards Reception where presentations are announced and recipients are honored is planned for July.

Applicants may apply every year; however, scholarship recipients are eligible only every third year, with a lifetime maximum of two CLHSAA scholarships. Students interested in applying for a 2007 CLHSAA grant should watch for a scholarship application form, which will be included with 2007 membership renewal forms to be mailed in January 2007.

The 2006 scholarship application forms were mailed in January along with membership renewal forms. The deadline for 2006 applications was March 15, 2006.

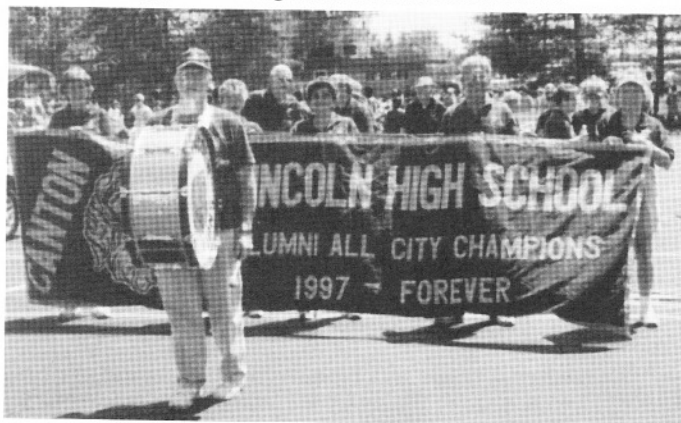

SCHOOL DAYS, SCHOOL DAYS

I'm sure you, like me, receive many items in your e-mail every day that you laugh at, scowl at, pass on, or delete. The internet thrusts more trivia at your eyeballs than we would ever have thought possible in earlier years. The other day, I received a quiz that was designed to show your age by what you remembered about a list of things, like Burma Shave signs, a pop bottle topped by a metal plug with small holes in it, milk wagons and bread wagons drawn by horses, a wooden cabinet lined with metal that was an ice box, canning jars with rubber gaskets and tight screw or latch-down tops, telephones that you dialed, party lines for telephones, no TV, etc. You get the picture.

The person who sent it to me said she was older than she thought because she could remember 12 of the questioned materials. The categories were listed as 1) Just a kid; 2) Getting up there; 3) Older than you think; 4) Older than dirt! There were 24 questions, and I got all 24. So, guess who can add to her list of honors and trophies the prestigious title of OLDER-THAN-DIRT QUEEN MOTHER?

The experience set me off on a nostalgic tour of my younger years. I remember the fun of reading the Burma Shave signs as we drove along the road. Don't get me wrong. I wouldn't want to go back to wringer washers, no microwave ovens, no computers, only standard shift cars, and garage doors you had to struggle with to close or open. I'm pretty much a modern creature of habit now.

My mother used to marvel at the progression of change she had seen in her life. Every day I become more like my mother (as we all do) in being astonished how our society has developed. It's hard to believe there are places in this modern world where people are still living just as their ancestors did many, many centuries ago. Is it any wonder there are cultural clashes when old and new try to pass on the same road?

That brought me to thinking about education. Today we have schools where high schoolers are taking college courses

as advancement to their studies, but they can't write a decent paragraph or spell better than a third grader. We have honor students in elementary and high schools who can't identify George Washington and what his importance is to our country. They, also, may not be able to name the capitals of the states, locate those states on a map, or find major countries in the world on a map.

There was a time when the most common school was the one-room school house where children of all ages were taught together. One teacher handled them, mostly without ever having gone to college. Big kids helped teach the little kids. Some great leaders came out of those schools.

When I got to Lincoln High School, I was so blessed to have a building full of teachers who were dedicated to expanding my learning horizons. We had an up-to-date curriculum for the time. I was from a poor family living in a housing project so the prestige of an affluent family didn't get me special treatment. I stretched and grew and sometimes groaned at the homework, but I never thought I was over worked. Mostly, I loved school. Some of my classmates were wonderful, and some are best forgotten; but I never felt like I wanted to take a gun or knife to any of them. We had a love for country, a respect for religion, and a sense of duty to our fellow humans without too much divisiveness in our thinking about morality and politics. Gross unkindness was not the norm.

As I give my four years at Lincoln a thorough scrutiny, I'm wondering if we weren't living in the "Golden Age" of education. Of course, there were many whose experiences were not like mine, or they didn't want to take advantage of the educational offerings. There will always be those kinds of individuals. But, for the ordinary kid in the years 1945 to 1949, Lincoln had so much to give. She's my Alma Mater. I sing praises to her name.

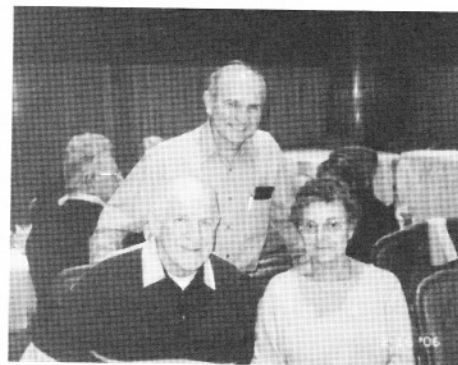

World War II Remembered

David L. Sponseller '49 and William J. Sponseller '44

Many of us from the earlier years of Lincoln have vivid memories of World War II. Did you ever stop to consider the vital role played by the people, steel mills, and factories of our school district--and of the greater Canton area--in defeating the mighty war machines of Japan and Germany? And what life was like during the war years?

Think first of the thousands of Canton boys and men who served in our armed forces, Merchant Marine, and Coast Guard during that massive conflict. These included many hundreds who attended Lincoln Junior High and graduated from McKinley High, as well as those who graduated from Lincoln after it became a senior high in 1942. Most famous of these was baseball, football, and basketball standout **Mike Rejina '44** who died in Germany just one month before VE Day. A plaque by the Lincoln auditorium bore the following inscription:

Michael J. (Mike) Rejina, Jr.
Captain, 1943
All-City All-County
Honorable Mention, All-State
Four years Regular Basketball
Pitcher on First Baseball Team; No-hit, No-run Game
Killed in Action April 5, 1945

I (William J. Sponseller) remember Mike well, and also some of these others from Lincoln that gave their lives:

John Cameron
Pete Caras
Richard Henry
Richard Householder
James Millhorn
Donald Nicholson

Perhaps you remember seeing the growing forest of white crosses erected in the yard of St. Joseph's Church on West Tusc. Those 25 crosses at war's end were a grim reminder to all who drove through Canton on the famous Lincoln Highway of the huge sacrifice the servicemen and their families from a single parish had made for the war effort. Stories of the ultimate sacrifice were repeated dozens of times throughout the Lincoln school district, as many of the stars in the blue-star flags that hung from living room windows of every second or third home turned to gold--a kind of grim and heart-wrenching alchemy. Did you ever think that our maroon and gold LHS school colors served as an unwitting metaphor of this sacrifice--maroon for the blood shed by those in combat, and gold for the many that fell? (In all, approximately 400 servicemen from Canton died in the horror of WW II.) As a Western Union delivery boy, **Dick Hight '47** had the grisly task of delivering telegrams from the War Department to parents of the fallen.

Besides those alumni who paid the ultimate sacrifice, many others distinguished themselves in combat. One of those (who finished HS at McKinley in 1941) joined the Army Air Force at the start of the war and spent the entire war in the Pacific. He shot down many Japanese planes and was one of only five

men from his squadron of 100 pilots to survive the war.

Think of the many lifestyle changes brought on by the war--severe gas rationing ('A,' 'B,' and 'C' stickers); walking everywhere; riding those huge gray 'cattle car' city buses; having no new cars to buy for four years; needing stamps and tokens to buy meat; adding orange powder to white margarine to resemble butter; growing vegetables in "Victory Gardens"; flattening tin cans and bundling newspapers for the war effort; shortages of many things; buying War Bonds and Stamps; darkening our homes and going into basements during air raid drills; viewing battlefield newsreels before the movies; singing "Don't Sit Under the Apple Tree" and "Coming In On a Wing and a Prayer," etc.; and, finally, dancing in the streets on August 14, 1945 (VJ Day).

Canton played an immense manufacturing role in WW II. The brown smoke belching from the Timken stacks that we could see from our classrooms signified the melting of several million tons of alloy steel that became the roller bearings, gears, axles, and weapons that landed on the beaches of Iwo Jima and Normandy. The huge new Westinghouse plant on Raff Road SW made many thousands of large gun barrels for the war. (Don Mellett Homestead, built along West Tuscarawas for the Westinghouse workers, housed many LHS students.) We lads often sat on the bank along Arlington Avenue NW and watched Army half-tracks rumble along the street to and from Diebold where their armor plate was installed. Beyond the LHS area, Republic Steel made alloy steel vitally needed for the war effort, and the Hoover Company made millions of proximity fuses for anti-aircraft shells. Far more examples could be given of crucial military production from our town--Canton, "The City of Diversified Industries."

In sum, we alumni of Lincoln High School should be quite proud of the very big role played by our fellow alumni in uniform, and by our parents and relatives working three shifts in the factories or making other sacrifices to preserve America's freedom during the biggest and most horrific war in history.

In a Related Story . . .

The new Timken High School Campus in downtown Canton houses a beautiful new restaurant named the All-City Grille. The purpose of the facility is to give Timken culinary students practical experience. The restaurant is open to the public on certain days.

As part of the decor of the new facility, those in charge wanted to display a piece of memorabilia from each of the four former city high schools. Bill Raymont, retired chief photographer from the Timken Company and an active member of the Timken High School Alumni Association, made contact with personnel at Heritage Christian School to see if they had any Lincoln items which they might contribute. The principal said there was a plaque bolted to the wall between the doors going into the auditorium. Heritage had the plaque covered with a colorful banner which had special meaning to their student body, but they would not donate the plaque unless CLHSAA approved the removal of the plaque from the building.

It turned out the plaque was the perfect piece of Lincoln history to take its place in the All-City Grille. It reads

DEDICATED TO THE MEN AND WOMEN
OF LINCOLN HIGH SCHOOL
WHO SERVED IN WW II.

1941 - 1945

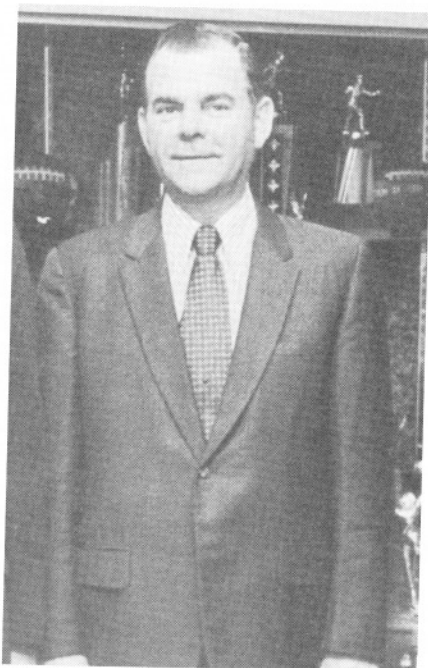

Friend, Teacher, Principal . . . ROBERT A. ASHBY



Robert A. Ashby, member of Lincoln's Class of 1943 and former teacher, assistant principal, and principal at Lincoln High School, passed away on Friday, July 1, 2005 at the age of 80. His daughter, Anne Walker of North Canton, wrote to say that both her father and her mother loved Lincoln so very much. (**Barbara Brandenburg Ashby '45** passed away in December 2003.) They celebrated 59 years of marriage before Barbara's death. Bob and his wife had one daughter and one granddaughter.

Mr. Ashby earned his Bachelor's degree and his Master's in Education degree from Kent State University. He proudly served in the U.S. Navy as a Naval gunner/sonar man during World War II. Before coming to Lincoln as assistant principal, Bob had taught at several other Canton City Schools, including Gibbs and Cherry Elementary. In 1958, he was awarded the distinction of being named Stark County's Teacher of the Year. When William Wolfarth retired, Mr. Ashby became Lincoln's principal.

Following 30 years of service as a teacher and principal, Bob retired from his career in education in 1976. However, he continued working as a realtor at Coldwell Banker for many years.

She thought that qualified me to write a short article about Mr. Lincoln, so, here goes.

The bicentennial of Mr. Lincoln's birth is coming up in 2009, and I think that everyone who attended any school named for him needs to start thinking about how we can celebrate the occasion. You can go to: <http://www.lincolnbicentennial.gov> and check out the festivities that are already being planned. You will also find lots of information and links to other web sites about our 16th and greatest (I don't care what that television poll said!) President. Right now the Lincoln Bicentennial Commission is campaigning for a special coin to be minted in his honor and asking that the public contact their Representatives and Senators to support that idea. They also need financial support. Early on, they were soliciting ideas for events that the Commission could sponsor, and I wrote to them and suggested a band competition involving all the schools named for Abraham Lincoln. (Never heard anything from them.) Take a look at the web page, and send in your ideas. This is another way we can Keep The Spirit Alive, both the spirit of the man and the school.

I also have some book recommendations for you. Doris Kearns Goodwin's *Team of Rivals* about Mr. Lincoln's election to the presidency and how he brought his former political rivals into his cabinet is excellent. If you are not familiar with Doris Kearns Goodwin, she is also the author of *No Ordinary Time*, a book about Eleanor and Franklin Roosevelt and World War II on the home front. That book can give you a whole new perspective on what our parents and grandparents went through during the war. My other recommendation is Harry Turtledove's *How Few Remain*. Harry Turtledove is the purported "master" of alternative history, and this book has the South winning the Civil War and what might have become of Mr. Lincoln after the war.

Our Classmate, Our Teacher . . .

ROBERT A. WILLIAMS

Avalon Taylor Schneider '46

Bob Williams is an alumnus of Lincoln High School in two ways, as a student and, later, as a faculty member. Graduating from Lincoln in 1944, Williams was fond of telling his students in later years that it took him six years to get out of Lincoln. After their initial delight at how slow he must have been, his students learned the truth. In those days, Dueber School boys and girls attended Lincoln in the 7th and 8th grades before their four years of high school classes. During all those student years, Mr. Williams' idol was "Pop" Richie, Lincoln boys' advisor.

World War II was still raging in 1944, so Mr. Williams was drafted and sent to the Philippines. He was on a ship on the way to invade Japan when the second atomic bomb was dropped; so, instead, he served as an Army baking instructor in postwar Japan. Upon returning home, Bob enrolled at Kent State, becoming the first member of his family to graduate from college. Before that graduation, Mr. Williams had a blind date at Meyers Lake's Moonlight Ballroom with a nursing student that eventually resulted in 55 years of happy marriage. That



nurse, Bob's wife Eileen, became the mother of a boy and a girl, a grandmother of eight, and a nursing home administrator before passing away four years ago after a series of strokes.

Mr. Williams' teaching career began in Perrysville, Ashland County, in a high school that had 75 students. He taught eight different subjects for \$2400 a year. From there he subsequently taught at Beach City, Canton South, and Lehman before finally arriving at Canton Lincoln, where he taught math and woodshop for five years. Many of his memories of the Lincoln faculty center on his friends, Mr. Sherff and Mr. Newlon. Recalling his Lincoln students, Mr. Williams said, "Those kids were so honest I could've left my wallet on my desk and none of them would've touched it." In contrast he sighed, "Education today--there's something wrong. Schools are teaching to the test, parents don't support the schools, and a big school doesn't mean a better school."

The reason Mr. Williams left Lincoln was because he received his master's degree in counseling and went to Glenwood, where he retired after 14 years. However, that retirement was short-lived since he then became Director of Career Planning at Stark Tech (now Stark State) and stayed there another 14 years. His duties included helping guide adults' career plans and testing for interests and academic ability. Mr. Williams' career came to a permanent end in 1994 when he retired to take care of his wife.

Today, after passing through the arbor that says "Eileen's Garden" and entering Mr. Williams' home, you'll see examples of his woodshop skills in the form of a beautiful walnut tea table and bookcase. You'll be greeted by his constant companion, Lady, a golden retriever. Besides woodworking, Bob plays golf, visits his brother in Arizona, enjoys season tickets to Mt. Union football games, and cheers on his athletic grandchildren. Most satisfying to him are time with his family and memories of a long career mentoring others.

He was an outspoken social activist who clashed with church and city officials over funding for his programs; however, he is generally considered an innovative and energetic leader who provided services for the poor until his death in 1983. J. Robert Coleman was honored posthumously with CLHSAA's 1996 Distinguished Alumnus Award.

Herbert T. O. Blue, a teacher at Central, McKinley, and Lincoln high schools, was an historian who wrote several books during his lifetime. One of those books was a history of Stark County.

Bek Stiner Gordon '45, was an actress who was the woman that "Steve Canyon" comic strip artist Milton Caniff picked from a chorus line to be the trench-coated model for his comic strip character Miss Mizzou.

Dave Wottle '68 won the Olympic Gold Medal in track in 1972. Dave is one of only four Cantonians to have achieved the title Olympic Gold Medalist. Others include Harry Steel 1924 freestyle wrestling, Ronnie Harris 1968 boxing, and Phil Hubbard 1976 basketball.

Scholarly and sports excellence of the **four** city high schools was considered a positive during Canton's history. City high school students were educated at four schools, including **Lincoln (Lions)** and **Lehman (Polar Bears)**. City students now attend and play for only **McKinley (Bulldogs)** and **Timken (Trojans)**.

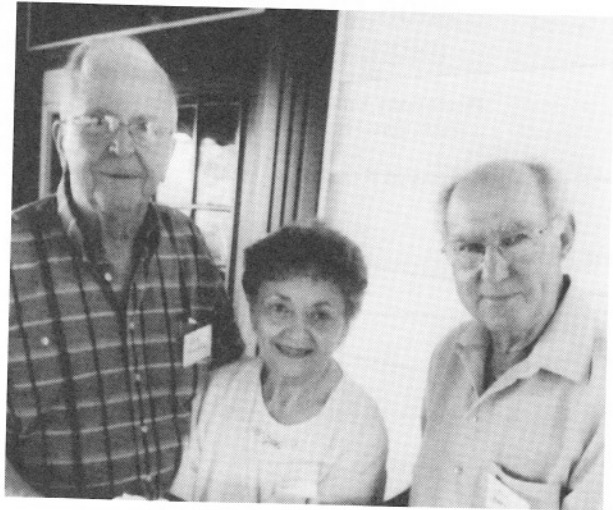
