Mason**. Over 850 loyal Lincoln friends (who didn't seem to mind the few mistakes or lack of air conditioning) came to support the CLHSAA Scholarship Fund. Watching Harry Mason direct the choir in the "Benediction" and the men dance "The Old Routine" made it a special evening to remember. A DVD or video is still available for \$25.00 if you missed this memorable event.

Thanks to the efforts of the cast and crew, headed by **John Hayward '64** and assisted by **Nan DeMuesy**, Carol Koontz, Bob Morrison, Betty Oswald, and **Janice Clark '47**, over \$10,000 was raised to benefit the scholarship fund.

But, until then, plans are being made for a "reunion choir concert" in October 2007. ### Spring Fiesta 2006 -- The Ambush!

Believe it or not--some of us were ambushed at the Spring Fiesta 2006, on June 24th, honoring **Ruth Cogan** and **Harry Mason!** Some of us will probably never be the same as a result. I know for sure that I will never be. Please let me explain.

The ambush came in stages. (Ha!) There were stages of memory, mush, respiration, and unity. Perhaps you experienced them too--not just from the stage, but maybe from the audience as well.

When I made all the arrangements necessary to fly from Dallas, Texas home to Canton, my motivation was to honor the man who was the biggest influence during my high school years. I didn't come from a home with loving parents, and Harry Mason knew that, and he became my role model for being a decent human being steeped in Christian principles. As a direct result, today I am closing in on a Master's Degree from Dallas Theological Seminary as a Christian Therapist (working for the Center for Christian Counseling in Flower Mound, Texas) and have spent a successful 37 years on-the-air as a news anchor, in TV and radio. I am still on-air at the top Christian radio station in America . . . and I thank Harry Mason for it all. He instilled the basics in me that I needed to make it. That's the background, so let's go back to the "ambush."

I flew in from Dallas Friday night for dress rehearsal for the show. The pressure was on to get to Lincoln on time from Cleveland Hopkins, the car rental place, and the traffic on I-77! My thoughts were centered on seeing my dear friends, the Snyders, on the song I would sing, and getting there on time. When I walked in the door of the school, stage one of the ambush occurred: an ambush of *memory*--an instant transportation back in time! Suddenly, it was 34 years ago for me. The only thing missing was the theme from "The Twilight Zone!" The sights and smells and sounds were the same: the marble cracked floor, the dimly-lit hallway, and the sound of several songs being rehearsed all at the same time in the auditorium, by various Lincoln Choir members. I didn't expect it. It was a total ambush, stage one!

Stage two came very quickly. After going down front and hugging the stuffing out of Linda Snyder, I met many other ex-choir members practicing their stuff. Then I was hit with *mush*--major emotion, because one by one, former choir members I knew traipsed in. We had hung together in high school! I don't know what happened, but I turned into a big mushball! We hugged and jumped like the kids we once were (and obviously still are!) and people were turning from what they were doing to see what had happened! All that shrieking. Surely someone had been stabbed or something! Ha! I surprised myself. All that mush from 30+ years ago resurfacing. How weird! But also how familiar.


Stage three didn't come until Saturday night when Paul Snyder wheeled Mr. Mason in. It was a *respiratory* ambush because I could hardly breathe! There was the man I respect so much and had come so far to honor . . . in a wheelchair. I was sad for a moment (about the chair) but then, when he smiled at me, all sadness vanished and I suddenly became his

voice student, once again. Rib cage up! Breathing deeply now. (Ha!) Oh no, more mush--when I saw two of my previous teachers, the DeComo's. A total ambush--I was so excited; I can't explain it! We hugged and got caught up. Then . . .

The show began. There had been stories of, shall we say, "rough" rehearsals! Nerves were frayed, and performers were concerned about how it would all come off. But, hey, this was LINCOLN! There was the ambush of *unity* that no one can explain. It always just happened, and that night it happened again. The performance was there--intact--in honor of Miss Cogan and Mr. Mason, in therapy spirit of true unity and excellence!

The last part of the unity ambush came during the Benediction, directed, as always, by Mr. Mason. All eyes were on Mr. Mason's hands, except mine were full of tears. It was more than I could handle, and I confess total submission to the ambush. In fact, I hope my sobbing was only in my head, because I could barely sing. (Was I the only one?) The audience was on its feet afterward, but I had left the stage, so overcome with emotion I was afraid it would distract the singers around me!

The next day, reflecting on the event, I struggled for words to describe it. My friend Linda called it a "mountain top experience" which probably comes the closest. The memories, mush, respiration, and unity of the night can never be duplicated! But, we can certainly gather again, maybe sometime down the road, to re-unite through music. I am truly grateful that I was "ambushed" by Spring Fiesta 2006. Am I the only one? Probably not. After all, we are LINCOLN HIGH SCHOOL, keeping the spirit alive--then, and now. And always.

## **Another Successful Scholarship Year**

When assessing the CLHSAA Scholarship Program, one must remember that Lincoln High was closed in 1976. However, through the efforts of this alumni association, the memory of one of the finest schools anywhere is being fostered by the awarding of scholarships to deserving students with some connection to our great school.

Again in 2006, a dessert reception was held at Westminster Community Church in honor of the recipients of the Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association Scholarships. On July 18th, forty-four \$500 scholarships were awarded bringing the total amount awarded since the program began in 1990 to \$295,300. Altogether 592 Lincoln graduates or descendants have received these awards. In 2006, twenty-eight of the scholarship recipients were recent high school graduates, and sixteen were current college students. We congratulate all of these recipients and wish them well in their futures.

There were seven "designated" scholarships awarded. For the eighth consecutive year, the Ed Mang, Class of 1951, Memorial Scholarship was awarded. The Class of 1950 donated a scholarship In Honor of the LHS Class of 1950, and Dennis Wiseman '73 gave a scholarship In Honor of the LHS Class of 1973. Other designated scholarships were provided by Jack & Alanna (Welling '69) Arnold; Karen Mottice Christoff '72 In Honor of Lee Lavery, LHS drama director and teacher; and two scholarships were donated by Deanne (Fitzpatrick '60) Jamal In Memory of Olive Fitzpatrick, her mother.

Applicants who did not receive a scholarship in 2006 are reminded that they may reapply. Graduates and attendees of Lincoln High School and Lincoln Junior High School, as well as their lineal descendants, are eligible for scholarships. (Please see the guidelines on Page 8.)

The members of the 2006 Scholarship Committee were Roger Hegnauer '71, chairman; Karen Mottice Christoff '72; Don Dorkoff '59; Paula Lightbody '71; and Sherry Schario Cini-Putnam '60. Sherry was also board liaison, Karen Gerzina Samuelson '60 was committee secretary, and Cindy King Fickes '75 and Jeanne Lee Jordan '75 were treasurers. Barb Pocock Hegnauer '71 was in charge of refreshments.

Thank you to all who helped, to everyone who donated to the scholarship fund, and to those who supported the fundraisers. Please continue your donations to "Keep the Spirit of Lincoln High School Alive." The 2007 awards will be given on July 17th at 7:00 PM at Westminster Community Church. Everyone is invited to attend this worthwhile event.

# Our Teacher . . . LUCY DeCOMO

There are lots of family businesses around, but Mrs. Lucy DeComo's family's business is rather unusual. It's education. Not only has Mrs. DeComo enjoyed many decades as a math instructor, but her husband, Mike. a 1953 Lincoln grad, is a retired Canton City principal; and their three children, a boy and two girls, are all teachers, too, as is a One has to daughter-in-law. wonder how many of the nine grandchildren will someday be teachers as well.

Mrs. DeComo spent ten distinguished years, 1966-1976, at Canton Lincoln teaching algebra, geometry, and pre-calculus. During that period, her skills were rewarded by her being named department chairman and given the title of Teacher of the Year. She has many words of praise for Lincoln, including, "If the schools hadn't been reorganized, I most certainly would have stayed at Lincoln. I truly enjoyed it there, have fond memories of it, and still keep in contact with some former teachers. The kids at Lincoln had families who wanted more for their children and were very supportive. The administration maintained good discipline and that's so important. And, no other schools' pep rallies ever compared with Lincoln's! They were the best!"

After Lincoln was closed, Mrs. DeComo was transferred to Timken High School where, for seven years, she was math department chairman. At that time, Timken was the math and science high school in Canton, while McKinley taught the humanities. In 1983, Mr. Paul Steiner, superintendent for Perry Schools, asked Mrs. DeComo to become math department chairman at Perry High School. She accepted the invitation and stayed there until 1993 when she retired.

But that was not the end of Mrs. DeComo's career in education. She is currently a part-time instructor at Walsh University, teaching pre-calculus, calculus, and algebra. Asked to compare college and high school instruction, she explained, "For college classes, you have to be more prepared and go much faster. There is absolutely no parental contact, and the only possible discipline problem is student attendance. Walsh tries to keep course sizes at 30 or less, and the university has a very strong science program, so many students are well prepared."

Beyond the world of education, Mrs. DeComo enjoys other interests. Naturally, her family would rank first. Beyond that she and her husband like to travel, and she particularly liked Italy and Quebec City. They attend the Broadway Series of plays at Playhouse Square and enjoy dinners in Little Italy, all in Cleveland.

The more you learn about former Canton Lincoln High School teachers, the more impressed you become about how lucky Lincoln students were to have people of the caliber of Mrs. Lucy DeComo and many others to instruct them.

#### **CLHSAA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM**

The purpose of the Scholarship Committee is to award non-repayable grants to deserving students who are either graduates or attendees of Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School or their descendants. Descendants include child(ren), grandchild(ren), great-grandchild(ren), step-child(ren), adopted child(ren), or spouse of attendees or graduates who are <u>paid members</u> of CLHSAA for the <u>current</u> calendar year. If the applicant's <u>only</u> lineal Lincoln ancestor is deceased, then the paid membership requirement is waived.

The Scholarship Committee will consider all applicants for grants regardless of race, color, creed, religion, sex, or national origin. All information supplied by applicants is strictly confidential with exception of names, addresses, telephone numbers, and names of ancestors who attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School.

CLHSAA reserves the right to determine the amount and number of grants to be presented in any year. Scholarships are awarded to students who are pursuing **ANY** type of post high school education at any type of accredited school; i.e., college, junior college, technical, or trade schools. Checks are made payable to each student's **school**. An Awards Reception where presentations are announced and recipients are honored is planned for July.

Applicants may apply every year; however, scholarship recipients are eligible only every third year, with a lifetime maximum of two CLHSAA scholarships. Students interested in applying for a 2008 CLHSAA grant should watch for a scholarship application form, which will be included with 2008 membership renewal forms to be mailed in January 2008.

The 2007 scholarship application forms were mailed in January along with membership renewal forms. The deadline for 2007 applications was March 15, 2007.

## **Our Community Spirit**

CLHSAA's Constitution states that the purpose of the association is to promote and continue the memories and spirit of the alumni, friends, and staff of Canton Lincoln High School. In addition, the intent of this association is to contribute to various community projects and to utilize our energy and funds for the betterment of the community of Canton, Ohio in general.

To this end, CLHSAA donated \$100 to each of the schools from which students entered Lincoln High School. (Today those city schools are Canton Art Academy, Cedar, Clarendon, Dueber, Harter, and McGregor Elementary Schools, and Souers Junior High School.) A formal presentation was made by CLHSAA President Paul Blohm at the December 11, 2006 Canton City School Board Meeting to Mr. Timothy Pickana, CCS Interim Treasurer. Checks were sent to each of these schools for use in their libraries (today, learning resource centers). Donations were also given to the libraries of St. Joseph Elementary and Heritage Christian School (our old Lincoln High building).

By earmarking the funds for the libraries of these schools, it was felt that the entire student body of each school could benefit. These so-called "feeder" schools were important to us then and now. Just one more example of our alumni association showing the spirit of Lincoln High again.

The idea of honoring Lincoln graduates who paid the ultimate sacrifice as United States servicemen during World War II and the Vietnam War (no LHS grads were lost during the Korean Conflict) was first conceived during one of CLHSAA's board meetings. Since Lincoln no longer has a school, there wasn't a place where these Lincoln veterans could be honored. Jim Mitchell '51 approached Dave Miday, Director of the J. Babe Stearn Community Center, about the possibility of using some lobby wall space at the Center. Since some of these fallen soldiers were also members of the club at some point, it made sense. Pictures of these men, as well as a plaque naming them, are displayed at the Center. Please feel free to drop by and see this display of ultimate dedication. A donation was made in support of this project by CLHSAA.

Those honored from Lincoln who were killed in action during World War II are Pete Caras '43, US Army; Jim Milhorn '44, US Army; Richard Householder '43, US Navy; Mike Rejina '44, US Army; Don Nicholson '43, US Navy; Richard Henry '43, US Army; and John Cameron '44, US Army. Those honored from Lincoln who were killed in action during Vietnam are David Lebeau '66, US Marines; Robert D. Snyder '65, US Army; Blair Starkey '63, US Navy; Johnny L. Smith '66, US Army; David L. Hilton '65, US Army; and Robert P. Kettering '67, US Army.





#### **RONALD W. DOUGHERTY, 1950**

Ron Dougherty was presented by his brother John Dougherty '51, fellow DAA honoree. John gave a summary of Ron's credentials including the fact that he graduated from Dartmouth College in 1954, was a lieutenant and captain in the U.S. Air Force from 1954-1957, and then graduated from the University of Virginia School of Law in 1960. Later that same year, Ron became a member of the law firm of Krugliak, Wilkins, Griffiths & Dougherty. 






**DENNIS G. REED, 1960**

#### We Remember Tom Hyde

This past year many of us had the great pleasure of being in contact with Lincoln alumnus Tom Hyde '53, former teacher and girls' basketball team coach, who taught at Lincoln in the mid-sixties. Tom initially contacted us to inform us that he had developed melanoma and that his death was near. His wish was that he could send us, from his home in Florida, his collection of Lincoln memorabilia, which proved to be extensive. His collection included reel-to-reel tapes of the band and choir, programs and ticket stubs from band concerts, choir productions, basketball and football games, photographs, newspaper articles, ribbons and badges, a stack of *Echoes* and seemingly countless other items. Clearly, his time at Lincoln and his relationship with our students was as dear to him as he was to us. It took two large boxes to contain all the items he had saved. Those items will be displayed at future Lincoln Alumni events.

The best part of Tom's contacting us was that nearly 50 former students were able to contact him by e-mail and share stories and memories before his death in January 2007. His wonderful wife, Peggy, visited Canton to host a small dinner in his honor and memory. It was heartwarming to hear about his many interests in life, including tennis, photography, video and music production, traveling, and bridge. Mr. Hyde was definitely a character, and we all remember the fun we shared with him. He retained his intelligence and keen sense of humor throughout the six months we were in contact with him, and he remained in good spirits until he passed away. We will always cherish his memory.

### Tom's Topics

Written by Tom Hyde

I graduated from Baxter Grade School in 1949 and Lincoln High School in 1953. For a decade, I worked at Timken Roller Bearing and co-op'd with Georgia Tech. Wanting something else, I left Tech and Timken's behind to become a teacher in Math & Physics, graduating in 1964 from Kent State.

Although I student taught Algebra at Lincoln, I started my teaching career there in a new program called Occupational Work Experience (OWE) with 30 LHS dropouts. At Lincoln, I was also assigned as advisor for the pep rallies, booster club, and cheerleaders. This led to many friends over the years. I also was "conned" into coaching in the annual Army-Navy girls basketball game! (Go, Navy!) I helped increase the booster club by so many students that we were able to fix the old gym scoreboard and even played crowd noise over the gym PA system (a first!). We worked very hard at practices and scrimmaged some of the best women athletes in the area. The height of our team wins was over the total school McKinley BB team at McKinley!

During this same period, Mr. Fox and I were trying to get my neighbor girl, Barb Beattie, to be able to play on the boy's tennis team. We tried the Ohio ruling group and were turned down, even though there was no one on the boy's team that could win a set off her. I did spend the next five years coaching Barb; and, to this day, she makes a living at tennis and has won many championships!

The OWE program was going very well, and I was asked to make several presentations at Kent. As a result, I was offered a job at Kent, which meant that I very reluctantly left my wonderful LHS kids! (I keep in touch with many of the LHS students that I felt were very mature for their age.) At Kent, and with my masters degree (1967), I worked with all the OWE teachers and trade teachers in the area around Canton and Akron. I also helped develop the OWA program for students under 16 years of age. (OWE was for students over 16 years of age.) OWE grew so fast that there were several hundred programs with well over 6,000 students enrolled. The state department asked me to head up the state OWE programs and trade programs in SE Ohio. So, I moved to the Columbus area, married a Spanish teacher from Akron University in 1970, earned my Ph.D. from the Ohio State University, and continued helping the program to grow.

Note: Thomas E. Hyde passed away at his home in Plant City, Florida on January 19, 2007 after a long illness. Before his passing, Tom contacted many local people who had been a part of his life here. One of those contacts included the above missive (edited down for space considerations) which shows how fond he was of his teaching career. His words show that he was particularly fond of the teaching position he held at Lincoln and of the students he encountered there.

Of course, there were additional successes in Mr. Hyde's life and career, including his tennis games. Suffice it to say that the educational field had a wonderful ally in Tom Hyde.
