Although they were not named after prominent individuals in our history, they are no less important in the history of Canton City Schools.

How the Schools Were Named

When I first pitched the idea to the committee about writing the history of the naming of the Canton City Elementary Schools, I was not envisioning how much research is available or how excited I would be about the history of the school system itself. So forgive me for going off into left field by first exploring a brief history of the Canton City School System. I consulted *The Canton Repository* and *A Collection of School Histories* by Gordon Humbert for my information.

In April of 1957 the National Education System celebrated its 100th Birthday, so it is now 161 years old. Andrew Johnson was Canton's first teacher in 1807-1808. The school building was located on the land now occupied by the Canton City Courthouse. It was like most one room schoolhouses that was reminiscent of those portrayed on Little House on the Prairie. You know what I mean. clapboard roof and windows covered with greased paper all of the students sitting in one room, too hot in the summer and too cold in the winter. Canton's first attempt at a free public school for all children to attend was in 1837. But by 1850 Canton voters passed a high school system, which took us another step forward. It would take volumes to review the changes that have taken place in the years from that humble schoolhouse to today's changes of materials and buildings, but the principles that educators have clung to are still intact.

In 1886, superintendent John H.
Lehman, stated this in his annual report:
"The teacher's most difficult task in the mental discipline of many pupils is training them to study and to cultivate correct habits of study. We attribute the cause largely to the fact that many children in the city schools are not trained to habits of industry at home." This statement is what brought me to write about our early schools. Regarding moral

training, which Superintendent Lehman called "the most important but at the same time the most difficult work that confronts the teacher," he said this: "We believe in giving the school a large share of responsibility for moral results, but we should not expect the schools to send out boys and girls who shall all become truthful, industrious, temperate and virtuous men and women, when we consider the evil temptations and practices and adverse influences to which many of the children are exposed in their lives out of school, and the fact that some homes morality is never taught or practiced."

Of the schools built in the 19th century, all of these original buildings are gone: East Fifth, North Cherry, South Plum, and Liberty. In some cases, new schools have been erected on the same site. These six are the oldest schools carried over from the 19th century: the Woodland and Roosevelt buildings, built in 1894; West North, 1895; Hartford, 1894; Cherry, 1898 and old Clarendon, 1899. When the present 12-room Cherry building was completed in 1898, it was considered so modern and elaborate that two railroads ran special excursion trains from Youngstown and East Liverpool so visitors could see it.

The Canton Lincoln High School Alumni Association honored the 2018 scholarship recipients with a dessert reception on July 17th on the lawn at Westminster Community Church. Thank you to all who helped, to everyone who donated to the scholarship fund, and to those who supported the fundraisers. Please continue your donations, and continue





CLHSAA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The purpose of the Scholarship Committee is to award non-repayable grants to deserving students who are either graduates or attendees of Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School or their descendants. Descendants include child(ren), grandchild(ren), great-grandchild(ren), step-child(ren), adopted child(ren), or spouse of attendees or graduates who are <u>paid members</u> of CLHSAA for the <u>current</u> calendar year. If the applicant's only lineal Lincoln ancestor is deceased, then the paid membership requirement is waived.

The Scholarship Committee will consider all applicants for grants regardless of race, color, creed, religion, sex, or national origin. All information supplied by applicants is strictly confidential with exception of names, addresses, telephone numbers, and names of ancestors who attended Canton Lincoln Junior or Senior High School.

CLHSAA reserves the right to determine the amount and number of grants to be presented in any year. Scholarships are awarded to students who are pursuing **ANY** type of post high school education at any type of accredited school; i.e., college, junior college, technical, or trade schools. Checks are made payable to each student's **school**. An Awards Reception where presentations are announced and recipients are honored is planned for July.

Applicants may apply every year; however, **scholarship** <u>recipients</u> are <u>eligible</u> only every <u>third</u> year, with a <u>lifetime maximum of two</u> CLHSAA scholarships. Students interested in applying for a 2020 CLHSAA grant should watch for a scholarship application form, which will be included with 2020 membership renewal forms to be mailed in January 2020.

The 2020 scholarship application forms were mailed in January along with membership renewal forms. * The deadline for 2020 applications is March 16, 2020.



CLHSAA 2018 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS AWARDS



Bruce Beatty, Class of 1946

At Lincoln High School, Bruce was first team All-Ohio, All-County, and All-City as an end/tackle in 1945. As a senior, he had 18 interceptions playing Middle Linebacker and was the first recipient of the Stark County Most Valuable Player recognition. Bruce earned his bachelors and masters degrees from Miami University of Ohio where he played end, defensive back for 1948 and 1950 MAC championships. He spent 18 football seasons as offensive line coach for Ara Parseghian at Miami University of Ohio and Northwestern. Bruce was an NFL Offensive Line Coach for New England, Houston Oilers, Detroit Lions, and Buffalo Bills. In his career, he coached in the AFL, NFL, USFL, and the German Football League. Bruce has three children, son - Kris Beatty and daughters - Sharon Manor and Kyle Thomas.

Mary Lou Frenz, Class of 1945

Mary Lou, commonly referred to as Robin, was a graduate of Westminster Choir College of Princeton, New Jersey with a bachelors and masters degrees in voice and choral conducting. She was a long time professor of music at West Chester University and the Minister of Music at First Presbyterian Church of West Chester, Pennsylvania. Robin was acclaimed for her incredible mezzosoprano voice that resulted in an extensive singing career throughout the United States, Canada, and Cuba. Her solo and concert tours were highlighted by performances with many of the great conductors of the world. After a 40 year career in vocal music, Robin moved to White Horse Village. It is there that she continued her passion for music by establishing a chorus of 75 residents. This group became a respected musical attraction in the area. Mary Lou Frenz passed away on October 21, 2016.





John Hayward, Class of 1964

John is a graduate of Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey. He did graduate studies in music and theater at Peabody Conservatory and the Universities of Kent State, Eastern Kentucky, Trenton State, and George Mason. John sang under the direction of many great conductors with the New York Philharmonic and the Pittsburgh, Boston, Philadelphia, and Cleveland Orchestras. He sang at the White House for President Lyndon B. Johnson. John taught high school choral music and theater for 40 years in New Jersey, Maryland, Virginia, and Ohio. He has served as the Minister of Music for several churches. Locally, he has been the director of the Canton Police Boys Club Choir, Canton Civic Opera [VOCI], Canton Symphony Orchestra, and the Greater Canton Mens Chorus. Currently, he is the director of Senior Sing, 9-11 Community Commemorative Choir and Minister of Music and Commissioned Pastor at Community Christian Church in North Canton. John is married to Jennifer Catazaro, Assistant Artistic Director of the Canton Ballet School, and father of 7 children: sons - Jon, David, Jeremy, Zachary, Cameron, Maximilian, and daughter - Isabella. He also has 7 grandchildren.

William Mottice, Class of 1952

Bill graduated from Kent State University with a triple major in health, physical education, and psychology. He did post graduate work at Malone College, Mount Union College, and George Williams College. He entered the United States Army and was later employed as the Acting Executive Director of the YMCA of North Canton. He developed the first swim program in Ohio for developmentally challenged children. In 1963, he was named the Director of Educational Services for the Canton Chapter of the American Red Cross where he was responsible for safety, youth, and nursing services while continuing his support of special needs programs and initiating programs for blind and deaf children. In 1969, Bill was named the Executive Director of the Trumbull County Chapter of the American Red Cross. He served in this role until his retirement in 1996 where he oversaw over 3,000 active volunteers and was the highest ranking officer for national disaster services. His career involved him in many significant events in United States history including hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, and riots. Bill is married to his wife, Ann. They have three children-Pamela, Scott, and Jeff and five grandchildren.



at the Hall of Fame Luncheon Monday, April 8, 2019 Tozzi's Restaurant, Canton, Ohio

Many of us remember Dave as the skinny kid from Clarendon Grade School, who was always running all around the neighborhood. He kept on running all the way through Lincoln High School and then college at Bowling Green State University. This running would prove to eventually take him to the 1972 Munich Olympics 800 meter Gold Medal race. And what a sight to behold!

That race was a life-changing moment for Dave Wottle. As he spoke to his audience at the HOF Luncheon, he recalled that race with humor and amazement of his accomplishments as if he was reliving every moment.

No one could describe this experience better than Dave himself when he said, "It was a fleeting moment in time, but it was the culmination of a lot of years of practice, preparation, and perseverance; and it's affected every day of my life since."

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
Dave Schemansky '66 retires from Green following 45 years as an engineer By Eric Poston, IndeOnline.com correspondent – Posted Apr 25, 2019

Dave Schemansky always knew he wanted to be an engineer because he wanted to build highways.

Schemansky was born and raised in Canton before he went on to Ohio University and received a bachelors degree in Civil Engineering in 1971. He started out working for the Division of Highways, which was called the Ohio Department of Transportation after 1972.

Eventually, he was offered a job with the Stark County Area Transportation Study (SCATS) as a transportation engineer. He worked there from December 1974 to May 1977 before taking a job with the Stark County Engineer's office.

Schemansky worked for the county until 2000, when he retired. He remained retired for three years but admits he really



He applied, took the civil service test, and eventually interviewed with the city. He was interviewed by several city officials along with City Engineer Paul Pickett, who he had never met before. Mayor at the time Dan Croghan also talked with him and within a few days the city called and offered him the job and he began in September 2004. Schemansky said his weaknesses were Pickett's strengths and they worked well together.

"Working for Paul Pickett has been a joy," Schemansky said. "Paul and I are like a hand and a glove." He said working with Pickett has always been a collaboration rather than a top-down approach. Working in the engineering department he said has been a great experience.

"Deb has been the best secretary I have ever had," Schemansky said. "She is organized as all get out."

Schemansky said Green is in good hands with Pickett and Wayne Wiethe, the planning director for the city. "They care about the community," Schemansky said. "The two of them have done a lot of good for the city of

John attended Harter Elementary School and Loren Souers Junior High School before going to Lincoln High School.

Cathy: Hi, John, thank you for speaking with us today. **John:** It's my pleasure. I figured if I stayed alive long enough you'd finally get around to me.

Cathy: So the obvious first question is: Why the name change? Are you in the witness protection program?

John: (laughs) No, nothing as intriguing as that. When I Joined Actors Equity (the professional stage actors union) I was informed that someone already had my name and I would have to change it. Coincidentally, I worked with another actor on a film who also had my same name and he had to change his as well.

Cathy: What film was that?

John: Footloose.

Cathy: THE Footloose?

John: If you mean the original film by that name, then yes.

Cathy: What was that experience like?

John: It was a blast! Everyone was incredibly nice to work with. And the best part is that after working on that film I ALWAYS win the "six degrees of separation from Kevin Bacon" game. (laughs)

Cathy: That movie had a lot of popular songs in it. It must have been fun dancing to that.

John: I'll let you in on a little secret. Not one note of the soundtrack was written when we filmed. All of that terrific music was added in post-production.

Cathy: Even the title song "Footloose"?

John: Yep! I heard it for the first time, along with everyone else in the audience, during the film's premiere at Grauman's Chinese Theater in Hollywood.

Cathy: Speaking of music, what are some of your memories of your time at Lincoln and with the choir?

John: Without a doubt, my fondest memories of Lincoln are of the A Capella choir and Mr. Mason.

Cathy: Why is that?

John: I suppose it was being in a group with a shared purpose: a love of music, a love of singing, and a strong desire to communicate that to others. Plus, in a town where playing sports was king, it felt a tiny bit subversive.

Cathy: Had you always wanted to be in the choir?

John: OMG yes! I had older siblings who were in the choir, and I saw every concert and musical for years before I ever got to Lincoln. Its reputation for excellence was well known.

Cathy: What did being in the choir teach you?

John: Discipline and hard work are far more valuable than talent.

Cathy: Really?

John: Absolutely. You quickly find out the world is filled with gifted and talented people.

Cathy: So you were pretty much ready for Broadway after starring in the shows at Lincoln?

John: Ha! No, I still had a lot to learn, both at college and in the real world. But the fundamentals of enthusiasm and hard work I learned while at Lincoln have remained the

Cathy: Do you ever miss Canton?

John: I loved growing up in Canton. So I guess I miss the Canton of my youth. I had lots of parks and open spaces to ride my bike and explore. I received a really good education in safe schools and had excellent teachers. In

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my neighborhood of Harter Heights, I felt a strong sense of connection. However, I was always drawn to the downtown area of Canton which was, when I was very young, still very much the city center. It seemed to me an urban wonderland with its elegant stores like Stern and Mann and the Parisian and the beautiful theaters like the Palace and Lowes. I loved the old Carnegie Library, which went to often for both school and for pleasure. And Canton had (and still does have) a great Community theater program, The Players Guild, a civic light opera, a ballet company and a symphony orchestra. All of this, made Canton a pretty impressive city to call home.

John: Oh, I also miss the food.

Cathy: Such as?

John: Heggy's chocolates, Pizza Oven pizza, Johnnie's

pastries—you know—all the health food.

Cathy: Rumor has it that you sent dozens of Johnnie's crullers via FedEx to serve at a swanky NYC party? Is that

true?

John: Sure did, and Heggy's candies as well. I've never met anyone who didn't love them after they tasted them. But I think you were referring to the infamous fashion model story, right?

Cathy: Maybe-want to tell it?

John: Not much to tell really. A bunch of models were at a party I was hosting and when one model tasted the crullers she asked where I had gotten them. I told her they were flown in from Canton that morning. She took another huge bite and then exclaimed: "I never knew they had such delicious pastries in China!"

Cathy: Any other rumors or myths you want to clear up? **John:** Sure why not? First, I don't have nearly as much money or real estate as I have been accused of having. Second, I'm not as dead as I have been accused of being. Everything else you've heard is probably true.

Cathy: What do you think of our alumni association? **John:** I think it's amazing and a real testament to the spirit of Lincoln. Bravo/Brava to all those who keep it alive and relevant.

Cathy: Thanks for taking the time, John, to answer our questions. Although we have many more...

Loren E. Souers

Loren E. Souers: An attorney, who was a 20-year active member of the Canton Board of Education. Mr. Souers was also active in other community groups. Students in fifth and sixth grades who had been attending Baxter, Cedar, Dueber, Garfield, Stark and McGregor went to the new two-year junior high school in the fall of 1963. The school was designed to serve the seventh and eighth grades, with the possibility of later expansion for ninth grade.

Dennis R. Smith

Dennis R. Smith: Arriving in Canton in 1910, Mr. Smith joined the staff of the Canton Daily News, now known as The Repository. Smith was most noted for his coverage of the Canton cultural scene of the times and it subsequent growth. He was an ex-officio member of the Canton Board of Education, whose meetings he attended and reported on regularly. Smith directed the spelling bee from 1947 to 1953. He developed a close association with youngsters through The Repository marble tournaments, which he conducted until his death, and accompanied three of the area winners to the competition on national championship. His name was submitted by students from Wells School for the new school building, which was dedicated in 1955.

A TRIBUTE TO MR. ANDREW KRISTY

January 10, 1922 – February 1, 2019 by Trish Alleshouse Morgan

As a teacher, guidance counselor and administrator, Mr. Kristy spent many successful years in the Canton City School District. During that time he touched the lives of students, teachers, administrators, parents and members of the community. As a student, I remember Mr. Kristy as a strict but fair person. He was someone who I felt had an understanding of what it might be like to be a student in the '60's. My friends who worked for him described him as a stern administrator with a very caring heart. A person who was willing "to go to bat for you when you needed a friend."

Although Mr. Kristy was born in Monessen, Pa., he lived the majority of his adult life in Canton, Ohio. He served in the Army Air Corps during World War II and was a radio operator on thirty missions. After his discharge, he attended the University of Pittsburgh and began his career in education. He held various positions in Canton City Schools, including teacher, guidance counselor, and assistant principal at Lincoln High School; assistant principal at McKinley High School; and principal at both Souers Junior High School and Timken High School. He later became the Business Manager for the district and served as Interim Superintendent for one year.

Mr. Kristy truly touched the lives of many people in our community. The many years that he invested in education at Lincoln High School and throughout the Canton City School District is an example to all of us, of the endeavors of true educator.

Harter



Elizabeth Aultman Harter: A civic-minded woman and community volunteer, Harter will be remembered as one of the most important and extraordinary women in Stark County history. Making her mark in many ways of Canton life, especially for families and children, she donated land for YMCA Boys Club (now the Urban League) and the YWCA day camp. Also, she was one of the organizers of the Canton Relief Association, later called the Canton Association of Charities, forerunner to the present United Way. Harter was

Canton's unofficial hostess for entertaining and greeting important personages at her estate, and her family rented their home on Market Avenue to William McKinley for his famous Front Porch speech. With her step-mother, they donated the land for Aultman Hospital, in the memory of her father, along with the Aultman Nurses home and the Aultman Home for Aged Women. She also donated a portion of her land, The Harter Estates, with the stipulation that a school be built within three years of the deed's transfer. The groundbreaking for the school occurred in August of 1925.



Cedar



Cedar (the street now known as Ninth Street SW was at one time named Cedar) had the first Parent Teacher Association. It was organized at the suggestion of Miss Maude Moore, primary supervisor, and Mr. Claude Keplinger was the first president.

Garfield



Garfield was built in a section formerly known as Petersburg, part of a farm of Peter and Julia Ann Housel. Originally known as Petersburg School, it later was changed to Garfield, no doubt honoring the President James A. Garfield.

St. Joseph



St. Joseph School opened September 21, 1902. The parochial school was located on the corner of West Tuscarawas and Columbus Avenue NW. When the school was at its peak, about 1300 children were attending in grades K-8. When the school closed in June of 2014, the enrollment had dropped to 104 students. Students from St. Joseph had the option to continue their private education at Central Catholic High School or they could attend public high school at Lincoln.

Dueber



Dueber was built on land which had been donated by the heirs of the Meyer's estate for the purpose of building a school. At first, only six rooms were needed to take care of the pupils. As the district grew rapidly and it became necessary to take over three classes on ninth street to be used as auxiliary rooms. The school boundaries were modified in 1900 when Clarendon building was opened.

Stark



Stark School was built in 1907 when the board purchased two out-lots from George W. Butler. A branch of the public library was housed at Stark for 28 years. The Canton Board of Education gave permission to the Council for Retarded Children of Stark County to use two classrooms in 1953 and added a third class in 1954.

McGregor




Archibald McGregor with his father John McGregor, immigrated to America from Scotland in 1828, where both were teachers at the Male Seminary. When they came to Canton, no free public schools existed. An activist for education, he served as one of the first members of the Board of Education. In 1848,

he was persuaded to take over the Stark County Democrat as editor and publisher, but the education of youth was his main objective. During the Civil War years, some views expressed in his newspaper were not popular, and he was arrested by the authorities and held for a short time. Still, he remained a leader in educational progress in Canton until his death. He was a member of the Canton Board of Education for seven years, even serving as president; served as County School Examiner; and served one term as County Auditor.

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LINCOLN TRIVIA

Lincoln High School was named after Abraham Lincoln. Erected from 1925 to 1926 because, as the rumor stated, it was built on quicksand. It was opened as a public junior high school in September of 1927. The school colors were gold and maroon, and the nickname was "Lion."

During the 1970s the Canton City Schools reorganized, and at the end of the 1975-'76 school year, both Lincoln and Lehman High Schools were closed. Although they served initially as junior highs, Lincoln High School was sold and would eventually house Heritage Christian School in 1999. Re-located to Broad and 13th St. NW, Lehman is still a middle school in the Canton City School District.

Throughout the years our Alumni Association has been fortunate to help "Keep the Spirit of Lincoln High School Alive" through our publication, the *Echoes of Lincoln*. The high school newspaper was called the *Lincoln Echo*. We can thank Beverly Eutzly Peters '47 for naming

the alumni association publication the *Echoes of Lincoln*. She felt it was appropriate because "all we have got left are the echoes of the sounds and the happenings from the past."
